The Count de Llano, His Catholic Majesty's Minister to this Republic, died here Yesterday, after a lingering and painful Illness.

Whitehall, May 11, 1793.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Sunday Night the 21st of April last, between Nine and Ten o'Clock, some evil-disposed Person or Persons unknown, did wilfully set Fire to Long Beech Hill Inclosure in New Forest, which was

discovered, and extinguished without much Damage; and that on the Night of the 22d, or early in the Morning of the 23d of April last, Furzy Lawn Inclosure was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire in several different Places, and the greatest Part of it consumed.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in setting Fire to Beech Hill and Furzy Lawn Inclosures as abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually set Fire thereto) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
