

Proof that such Merchandize and other Articles are not of the Product of France, and had not been improved or paid Duties within any of the Possessions of France.

This Edict was accompanied with Instructions for the Intendants and other Officers of the Revenue, for the more effectual Prohibition of all Trade with France, without injuring the Commerce with other Countries. There is a particular Instruction with regard to the Manufactures of Great Britain: And, in order to avoid any Detriment which might ensue either to the Spanish or British Subjects, from the great Similarity of various British Manufactures to the Manufactures of France, it is provided, that upon the Arrival of any such British Manufactures at the Ports of Spain, it shall be sufficient Proof of their not being French Manufactures, if Certificates be produced from the Magistrates of the Ports of Great Britain from whence such British Manufactures may come, attested by the Spanish Consul (if there should be one) that such Manufactures are of the Fabric of Great Britain: And, upon the Production of such Certificates, such British Manufactures shall be admitted to Entry, and be permitted to be sold, on paying the accustomed Duties. There is also an Instruction, requiring Letters of Marque and Privateers, which may bring French Prizes into the Ports of Spain, to conform to the Maritime Ordinance in that Respect.

The King has also been pleased to grant to the Reverend George Gascoyne, of Saint Maries in the County of Kent, Doctor of Laws, and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname and bear the Arms of Chandler only, in Compliance with the Desire of Sarah Chandler, of Bruton-Street, in the Parish of St. George, Hanover-Square, in the County of Middlesex, Widow of George Chandler, late of Bruton-Street aforesaid, Esq; deceased, the maternal Uncle of the said Doctor George Gascoyne; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office:

And also to order that these His Majesty's several Concessions and Declarations be registered in His College of Arms.
