

Whitehall, June 18, 1793.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on the 1<sup>st</sup> of February last, as His Majesty's Excise Cutter the Resolution was cruising near Mort Bay in Bristol Channel, she fell in with a large armed Smuggling Luggger, which bore down and fired upon the Excise Cutter, whereby James Steward, One of the Crew, was killed, and the Rigging, Sails and other Parts of the Cutter much damaged.

It has been also humbly represented to the King, that the Coroner's Inquest, upon a View of the Body of the said James Steward, have brought in a Verdict of wilful Murder against Persons unknown.

His Majesty, for better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above daring act of Violence, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any Person (except the Master or Commander of the Smuggling Luggger) who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, the Commissioners of Excise do hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons making such Discovery (except as before excepted) to be paid by their Secretary on Conviction of any One or more of the Offenders.

RESOLVED, That this Court, taking into Consideration the Zeal, Ability, and Disinterestedness manifested by the Most Noble Marquis Cornwallis in the Conduct of the East India Company's Affairs, during the Whole of the Period for which he has presided over the British Interests in India, are of Opinion, that, as a Mark of the high Sense entertained by this Court of his Lordship's Merits and Services, the Marquis Cornwallis be requested to accept an Annuity of £5000, to issue out of the Territorial Revenues in India, for the Term of Twenty Years, to commence from the Day of his Departure from India, provided the Marquis or his Son, the present Lord Brome, shall so long live.

RESOLVED, That the above Resolution be recommended to the General Court of Proprietors for their Concurrence, subject, however, to the Approbation and Confirmation of the Commissioners for the Affairs of India, agreeably to the Provisions contained in the Act passed in the present Session of Parliament.
