

“*Brunswick, from any Country belonging to the United States of America;*” it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful, from and after the Tenth Day of July, 1793, to import into such Port or Ports in the Islands called Caicos, as shall be approved of by His Majesty in Council, Sugar and Coffee, the Produce of any Foreign Country or Plantation, in such Foreign Ships, and subject to such Regulations as are prescribed in the said Three Acts, passed in the Twenty-seventh, Thirtieth, and Thirty-second Years of His present Majesty’s Reign, with respect to the Ports therein mentioned: His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby approve of the Port of St. George’s Harbour, in the Grand Caicos, one of the said Islands called Caicos, to be a Port for the Importation of Sugar and Coffee, the Produce of any Foreign Country or Plantation, in such Foreign Ships, and subject to such Regulations as are prescribed in the said Acts.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty’s Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

It has been also humbly represented to the King, that the Coroner’s Inquest, upon a View of the Body of the said James Steward, have brought in a Verdict of wilful Murder against Persons unknown.

His Majesty, for better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above daring act

of Violence, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any Person (except the Master or Commander of the Smuggling Luggur) who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
