

Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant August: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant August to the Thirty-first Day of October next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the Twenty-fifth of January last, to order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever should at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of the said Order, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles before mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, (except for the Purposes and to the Places mentioned in the said Order;) which Order was, by another Order dated the Twenty-fourth Day of July last, continued for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twenty-fifth of the said Month of July. And whereas it hath been represented, on Behalf of the principal Importers and Venders of Bar-Iron in the City of London, that great Loss and Inconvenience will result to the Trade, by the Exportation of Bar-Iron continuing to be prohibited to Countries in Amity with His Majesty, without special Orders being obtained for that Purpose: His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, (as it is hereby ordered) That from and after the Date hereof, the Exportation of Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall, notwithstanding the said Orders, be permitted and allowed

from any of the Ports of this Kingdom to any Country, in or out of Europe, in Amity with His Majesty, in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law; provided the Merchant Exporter of any such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and to produce, within Twelve Months from the Date of the Bond, from the British Consul resident at the Port for which such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron shall be cleared out, or, in case there shall be no such Consul there resident, or he shall be absent from the same, then from Two-British Merchants resident there, a Certificate or Certificates that such Bar-Iron and Pig-Iron has been all duly delivered at the Ports for which the same was cleared out; and the Bonds or Securities shall not be cancelled or delivered up but on the Production of such Certificate or Certificates. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
