SIŔ. Beg Leave to acquaint you, that I failed from the Downs on Monday, at Eleven, P. M. and the following Evening anchored off Nieuport between Seven and Eight. The Enemy were firing upon the Town from their Guns and Mortars. I found Captain Murray with the Squadron I had detached to their Assistance; from him I learnt that the Garrison stood in great Need of Artillery, Powder and Ammunition, and were very weak in Point of Artillery Men; 60 Seamen were fent from the Ships, under the Command of Mr. Thomas Gibbs, Acting Lieutenant of the Triton, whose Conduct has been highly meritorious; a Party of 40 Seamen and Marines from the Quebec, with a large Supply of Powder and Ammunition, was fent on Shore in the Morning under the Direction of Captain Rogers, who requested to command the Naval Detachment; to his active Zeal and Ability the Service is much indebted. Lieutenant Clements, who at present commands the Albion armed Ship, was kept in Readiness to force their Way into the Harbour, which was in Possession of the Enemy, when that Measure was deemed necessary. The Detachment from Ostend were feen marching along the Strand in the Morning, and foon entered Nicuport. The Enterry, however, rendered our Intentions uffields, for they abandoned their Enterprize in the Night. I refer to Sir Charles Giey's Letter for the Detail of the Military Operations, respecting the Security of this important Post. Mr. Gibbs is the Bearer of this Dispatch, to whom I refer you for Particulars.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December last, to promife and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pound's for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service; should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Licutenants of Ilis Majefly's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for railing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty five nor, under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforefaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February last, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman of Scamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this Instant October: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thire ty-first Day of December next, inclusiver Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
