An All for altering, repairing and widening the Road from Burtry Ford in the County of Durbam to Alfton in the County of Cumberland, and from Alfton aforefaid, by the Dyke, to Burnftones in the County of Northumberland.

An AA for repairing and widening the Road leading from Saint Martin Stamford Baron to Kettering, and from Oundle to Middleton Lane, in the Parifs or Hamlet of Middleton, in the County of Northampton.

As A.3 for continuing the Term of Jo much of an Act of the Twelfth Year of His prefent Majesty as re-Intes to the Road from Carter's Bridge, in the Parish of Chatteris, within the Isle of Ely in the County of Cambridge, to the Forty Feet Bridge, in the Parish of Ramsey in the County of Huntingdon.

An Ast for amending, widening, altering and keeping in Repair, the Road from Dunchurch to Southam in the County of Warwick.

in the County of Warwick. An Act for repairing the Road from Stirling to Dumbarton, and feveral other Roads in the Counties of Stirling, Dumbarton and Perth.

An Act for enlirging the Terms and Powers of Two Acts, made in the Twentieth and Thirtieth Years of the Reign of His late Majefty King George the Second, for repairing the High Road leading from the North End of the Cow-Caufey, near the Town of Newcastle upon Tyne, to the Town of Belford, and from thence to Buckton Burn, in the County of Northumberland.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7 HEREAS His Majefty was gracioully pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December 1792, to promife and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themfelves to ferve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majefty's Ships or Veffels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majefty was also graciously pleased, by His faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should fo enter themfelves as aforefaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majefty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majefty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, 1793, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on

board His Majefly's Ships, fhould be paid to any Perfon who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majefty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majefty's Ships or Veffels in the Ports or on the Coafts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this inflant April: And it being judged expedient for His Majefty's Service that the faid Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirtieth Day of this inftant April to the Thirtieth Day of June next, inclusive: Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

As feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain; bawe, from Time to Time, gene into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the filewoing Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majestics King George the First and Second and of His prefent Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penaltics & sy may incur by Disobedience to them : And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

I F any Perion shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Aflizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Diferetion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm,
