British Settlements or Factories in the Lan I dies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles, for the Surposes of Trade, to Ire land, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in Ame rica, or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles do first make Oath of the true Defination of the fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purpofes specified, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Sati-fac tion of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Atticles have been duly landed at take Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cicque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Letter, of which the following is an Extract, L dated Contyck, July 15, 1794, has been received from His Royal Highness the Duke of York by the Right Tonorable Henry Dundas, one of His . Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

N Saturday Afternoon the Enemy attacked al! the Out-Posts occupied by my Advanced Corps in Front of the Canal leading from Brussels to Antwerp, and, being greatly superior in Numbers, drove them into the Town of Malines, upon which Place they likewise fired; but, upon a Reinforcement ar . riving, under the Command of the Earl of Moira, the Enemy fell back, with some Loss.

This Morning, howe r, they renewed the Attack, and having succeeded in coliging the Posts on

he Left of Malines to abandon the Canal, and to remeat from the Dyle, Lieutenant-General Dalwig thought nimial obliged to fail back to Welhem, where he has taken up a Position, to cover that Pass of the River. I have detached Lord Moira to take Posfession of tre-Village of Duffel upon his Left; and General Wallmoden, with the Hanoverians, is at Lictre.

St. James's, Wednesday July 16, 1794.

The Sovereign and Knights Companions being feated, the Chancellor fignified to the Chapter the Sovereign's Pleasure for silling up the two vacant Stalls in St. George'. hapel at Windsor; and the Knights Companions proceeded to the Election. The Suffrages being collected by the Chancellor, and presented to the Sovereign, Prince William Frederick, (now out of the Kingdom) Son of his Royal Highness the Duke of Glowester, was, by His Majetty's Command, deciared duly elected; and as, by the Statutes, none but a Knight can be elected, Garter and Black Rod were fent to introduce his Grace the Duke of Portland, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who was knighled by the Sovereign with the Swo d of

After which the Knights Companions proceeded to a Second Election; and the Suffrages being collected by the Chancellor, and presented to the Sovereign, the Duke of Portland was, by His Ma-jesty's Command, declared duly elected. His Grace was thereupon received at the Door of the Chapter-Room by the two Jun or Knights Companions, and conducted between them to he Sovereign, preceded by Garler King of Arms, (bearing the Enfigns of the Order on a Cushion) and black Rod.

Garter King of Arms prefenting the Garter to the Sovereign. His Majetly delivered it to the two Senior Knights, who buckled it on his Grace's Lett Leg, the hanceller pronouncing the Admoaici n.

Garter then presented the Ribbon with the George to the Sovereign, and ris Grace kneeing, the Sovereign, with the Affillance of the two Senior Knights Companiers, put it over the Duke's Shoulder, the Charcellor in the moun Time pronouncing the Admonition; and the Duke, having kissed f is Majesty's trans, and severally saluted the Knights present, with dow.

Garier then called over the Knight; and a Procession we made bath to His Majesty's Apartment, in the Order as before.
