To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The unanimous Address of the Grand Jury of the County of the City of Dublin, at Trinity Term, 1794. assembled.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Foreman and Brethren of the Grand Jury of the County of the City of Dublin, at Trinity Term assembled, beg Leave humbly to approach your Throne with heartfelt Congratulations on the late glorious and brilliant Success of your Majesty's Arms under the Command of that gallant and experienced Officer Earl Howe.

We fervently hope that the many and important Advantages obtained by your Majesty and your Allies may incline the deluded Inhabitants of France to sue for Peace; and that the Loyalty and Unanimity that prevail in these Kingdoms, may shew them the Madness and Impossibility of any Attempts to shake the Morals or Principles of Subjects who enjoy real Liberty, and whose King reigns in the Hearts of his People

We beg Leave to return your Majesty our grateful Acknowledgments for the continuing in the Government of this Country a Viceroy under whose firm (though mild) Administration, Outrage has been crushed; the national Strength called forth; the Vigour and Energy of the Law maintained; Public Credit upheld and extended, and such wise and salutary Acts passed, as entitle him to our fullest Confidence, and secure to your Majesty's faithful Subjects of this Realm the ample Enjoyment of that unparalleled System, the British Constitution.

To the KING.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the General Convention of the Royal Boroughs of Scotland, assembled in their annual Meeting, according to the ancient Statutes of this Realm, embrace this Opportunity of presenting at the Foot of your Majesty's Throne the warmest Tribute of the Zeal and Affection of our Hearts, to the Person and Government of one of the best Princes, that ever ruled over any Nation.

It is our Brast that in these evil Times, when the Attacks of our foreign Enemies have been traitorously seconded by the Conspiracies of domestic Foes, you, faithful Burghers, stand firm and unshaken in their Loyalty; and are at the Moment employed like true Patriots, in contributing every Aid that is in the Compass of their Abilities, in support of the Civil Power, and the Maintenance of the Executive Government of this Country.

The just and wise Ue which your Majesty has made of those necessary Measures, which, through the Wisdom of Parliament, have been taken to strengthen your Hands, for the Protection of your People in this Conjunction of national Danger,

demands on our Part the highest Expression of our Gratitude, when we consider on the one Hand the Value and Extent of that Happiness, which the execrable Machinations of our Enemies were formed to take from us; and on the other, the unspeakable Miseries which the Success of their Schemes must have entailed upon this Nation; we offer up our Thanks to the Divine Providence for having thus mercifully vouchsafed to defeat those dark and dreadful Purposes by a timely Discovery.

Permit us, Sir, at the same Time, to join our Voice to that of the great Body of the Nation in presenting our most hearty Congratulations on the late glorious Success of your Majesty's Arms in the great Naval Victory obtained under the Command of the gallant Earl Howe over the Enemies of this Country, and the Foes of the Human Species: We anticipate with Joy the happy Effects of this signal Success in hastening that auspicious Period when we shall once more enjoy the Blessings of a lasting and honourable Peace.
