His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in writing the said Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, the said William Tennant, Esq; hereby offers a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid (except as is above excepted) to be paid, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

Downing-Street, July 10, 1794.

Whereas it has been represented to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that in the Night of the 18th Ultimo, about Eleven o'Clock, a Lagger of about Thirty Tons Burthen, laden with Spirits and Tobacco, appeared off Sizewell, on the Coast of Suffolk; that being hailed, and required to shorten Sail by the Boat belonging to His Majesty's Excise Cutter the Liveley, the said Lagger discharged a

Volley of Musquetry into the said Boat, and continued to engage her with Small Arms for about Ten Minutes, when Two Men were wounded; that, upon the Boat returning with more Men, the said Lagger was found on Shore on Sizewell Beach, and immediately renewed the Firing, continued it for some Time, and wounded another Man; and that the Crew of the Lagger afterwards kept up a constant Fire on His Majesty's Cutter till about One o'Clock, when they quitted the said Lagger, and set her on Fire.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons under whose Direction or Conduct this Act of Violence and Felony has been committed, is hereby pleased to offer His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of the Offenders, who shall discover his, her or their Accomplices therein, (except the Master or Commander on Board the said Lagger) so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are hereby pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, the Master or Commander of the said Lagger; and also a Reward of THREE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, the Mate or Second in Command of the said Lagger, to be paid by the Commissioners of the Excise on Conviction.
