Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majefty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deferved, and imploring His Bleffing and Affiftance on Our Arms, and for reftoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms : And We do strictly charge and command, That the faid Publick Faft be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation ; and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may justly inflict on all fuch as contemn and neglect the Performance of fo religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation feen, ye forthwith pass to the Market-Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance : And Our Will and Pleafure is, That Our Solicitor do caufe printed Copies hereof to be fent to the Sheriffs of the feveral Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to fee the fame published; and We appoint them to fend Copies hereof to the feveral Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the fame may be published, and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS by an A& passed in the Thirty-third Year of His markers intituled, " An Act to amend an Act made in the \* Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His prefent Ma-" jefty, intituled, An Act for regulating the Imporer tation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment " of the Daty on Foreign Corn imported, and of " the Bounty on British Corn exported," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majefty, His Heirs and Sucseffors, and He and They is and are thereby authorized, with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, at any Time when the General Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or · Scotland respectively, taken as in the faid Acts, palled in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His present Majesty's Reign, is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which

Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the fame Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from Ireland or the Province of Quebec, or the other British Colonies and Plantations in North America, at the first Low Duties specified in the Table marked E. in the faid Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland refpectively, as the Cafe may be, of any fuch Sort of Corn or other Articles mentioned in the faid Acts; and in like Manner, at any Time when the Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the faid Acts, passed in the Thirtyfirst and Thirty-third Years of His prefent Majesty's Reign, is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the fame Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from any other Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the faid Table marked E. to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, or the taking out of Warehoufe for Home Confumption, of any fuch Sort of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, on Payment of the fecond Low Daty only, and no other ; and in the like Manner to recall fuch Prohibition or Permission, if Circumstances shall appear fo to require : Provided always, that as often as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majefty, His Heirs or Succeffors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, fuch Permiffion shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpofe.

And whereas, in purfuance of the Powers vefted in His Majefty by the faid Act paffed in the Thirtythird Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign. His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council. was pleafed, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 28th of August, 1793, to prohibit (under the Provisions, Regulations and Exceptions therein mentioned and referred to) until the 30th of November then enfuing, the Exportation from any of the Ports of that Part of Great Britain called England of any Rye, Peafe, Beans, Barley, Beer or Eigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Bifcuit made thereof; and in like Manner to prohibit the Exportation from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland of any Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peafe, Beans, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Bread or Biscuit made thereof; and also to declare and order, that from and after the Date of the faid Order, until the Thirtieth Day of November then enfuing, it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse for Home Confumption, any Foreign
