IN Confequence of the prefent Interruption to the Correspondence between this Country and Holland, a Communication will be immediately opened by His Majesty's Packet-Boat's between Yarmouth and the Elbe, and the Mails will be made up and diffatched from this Office every Tue/day and Friday Night as ujual; and as the Letters to and from all Parts of Europe, except Spain and Portugal, will now be fent through this Channel, it is meceffary to inform the Public, that from this Time. the Postage of all Letters to Holland or Flanders, mult be toud before hard the forme as to Hamburgh to be paid before-hand, the fame as to Hamburgh, to all Parts of Germany, and the North of Europe, at the Rate of One Shilling each fingle Letter, Two Shillings double, Three Shillings treble, and Four Shillings the Ounce, without which they cannot be forwarded; and the fame Rates are to be paid for all Letters from these Countries.

Befides the foregoing Rates of Foreign Postage, it will be neceffary, as usual, to pay at the Office in Great Britain or Ireland, where such Letters are put in, the full Port to Londrn.
