 be Electors of Members to serve in Parliament for  
 the said City and Liberty of Westminster, having,  
 on the Thirteenth Day of January last, presented  
 their Petition to the House, praying that they may  
 be admitted as Parties to oppose the Right of Elec-  
 tion which has been deemed valid in the Judgment  
 of the said Select Committee; and the Petitioners  
 insisting, that the Right of Election, which hath  
 been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said  
 Select Committee, is the antient and true Right  
 of Election for the said City and Liberty of West-  
 minster, therefore pray, that they may be admitted  
 as Parties to defend such Right of Election, so re-  
 ported to the House as aforesaid, and that they  
 may have such further and other Relief as to the  
 House shall seem meet. I do hereby give Notice,  
 that the House has appointed Tuesday the Third  
 Day of March next, at Three of the Clock in  
 the Afternoon of the same Day, to take the said  
 Petition into Consideration, at the same Time that  
 the Petition of the several Persons, whose Names  
 are thereunto subscribed, Electors of Members to  
 serve in Parliament for the City and Liberty of  
 Westminster, is ordered to be taken into Con-

Madrid, January 28.

By Accounts published by this Court of the Pro-  
 ceedings of the Enemy before Rosas, dated the 11th  
 Instant, it appears that the Place still held out, not-  
 withstanding the Evacuation of the small Fort de la  
 Trinidad; that the Operations of the Enemy had  
 been considerably slackened by some deep Falls of  
 Snow, and the general Inclemency of the Weather;  
 and that a spirited Enterprize had been executed, by  
 a small Body of Spanish Volunteers, on the Enemy's  
 Park of Artillery, in which they succeeded in spiking  
 14 Guns, having killed and made Prisoners near  
 150 Artillery-Men.

Accounts have also been received here, that on the  
 10th Instant Admiral Langara, in cruizing off the  
 Coast of Catalonia, fell in with and captured the  
 French Frigate *Hiphigenie*, of 32 Guns, which had  
 sailed from Toulon on the 4th Instant, in Company  
 with *La Vestale*. They had been separated Three  
 Days before in a Storm, in which it is supposed that  
*La Vestale* was lost.
