That certain Persons, pretending to be Electors of Members to serve in Parliament for the faid City and Liberty of Westminster, having, on the Thirteenth Day of January last, presented their Petition to the House, praying that they may he admitted as Parties to oppose the Right of Election which has been deemed valid in the Judgment of the faid Select Committee; and the Petitioners insisting, that the Right of Election, which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Committee, is the antient and true Right of Election for the faid City and Liberty of Westminster, therefore pray, that they may be admitted as Parties to defend such Right of Election, to reported to the House as aforesaid, and that they may have such further and other Relief as to the House shall seem meet. I do hereby give Notice, that the House has appointed Tuesday the Third Day of March next, at Three of the Clock in the Asternoon of the same Day, to take the said Petition into Consideration, at the same Time that the Petition of the several Persons, whose Names are thereunto subscribed, Electors of Members to ferve in Parliament for the City and Liberty of Westminster, is ordered to be taken into Consideration. By Accounts published by this Court of the Proceedings of the Every before Rosas, dated the 11th Instant, it appears that the Place still held out, notwithstanding the Evacuation of the small Fort de la Trinicial; that the Operations of the Enemy had been considerably slackened by some deep Falls of Snow, and the general Inclemency of the Weather; and that a spirited Enterprize had been exceuted, by a small Body of Spanish Volunteers, on the Enemy's Park of Artillery, in which they succeeded in spiking 14 Guns, having killed and made Prisoners near 150-Artillery-Wen.

Accounts have also been received here, that on the 10th Instant Admiral Langara, in cruizing off the Coast of Catalonia, fell in with and captured the French Frigate l'Iphigenie, of 32 Guns, which had fulled from Toulon on the 4th Instant, in Company with La Vestale. They had been separated Three Days before in a Storm, in which it is supposed that

La Vestale was lost.
