PROCLAMATION,

For apprehending Robert Thomas Crossfield.

GEORGE .R.

WHEREAS Robert Thomas Crofsfield, late of Dyers Buildings, in the Parish of St. Andrew, Holborn, in the County of Middlesex, Surgeon, Ands charged with Suspicion of High Treason: We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and commanding all Our loving Subjects to discover and apprehend, and cause to be discovered and apprehended, the said. Robert Thomas Crossfield, and to carry him before Some of Our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town or Place where he shall be apprehended, who are respectively required to fecure him, and thereof to give speedy Notice unto Our Privy Council, or one of Our Principal Secrestaties of State, to the End he may be forthcoming and may be dealt withal, and proceeded against according to Law. And whoever shall discover and apprehend the faid Robert Thomas Crossfield, and bring him before fuch Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, or so discover him that he may be apprchended, shall receive for Reward the Sum of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS; which faid Sum of Two Hundred Pounds the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-seventh Day of February, in the Thirty- stance, and particularly in this last, in which, I am soft Year of Our Reign. fifth Year of Our Reign.

Dispatch, dated Osnabruck, February 28, 1795. of which the following is an Extract, has been received by His Royal Highness the Duke of York from the Honorable Lieutenant-General Harcou t, and communicated by His Royal Highness to the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, One of His Mejesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

I Lose no Time in acquainting your Royal Highnefs, that on the 24th Instant the Enemy advanced in Force upon the Posts of Nienhuys and Velthuys, which were under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Strutt, and occupied by the Loyal Emigrants and a Detachment of Rohan and Bouille's Corps. These Troops, after the most gallant Resistance, were forced, with the Loss of about One Hundret killed and wounded, to fall back upon Northorn, and the French occupied those Two Posts in some Force. They also surprized a small Picquet of Salm and Hompesch Hussars in Oldensaul, which they occupied, but were repulsed, when advancing on this Side of that Place. Lieutenant-General Abercomby, who commands at Bentheim, &c. intended to attack and re-occupy the Posts of Nienhuys and Velthuys. This Measure was, however, rendered unnecessary, by the Retreat of the French, who left all those Posts on the 26th, directing their March towards Hardenberg, and Licutenant-Colonel Strutt immediately reoccupied them.

The last Reports we have received state, that the Enemy are precipitately marching their Troops from Hardenberg and Groeninguen towards Zwall, and that they have even evacuated Covoerden, taking with them the Ammunition and Part of the Cannon from that Place. It would be unjust in the extreme not to mention to your Royal Highness the particular Gallantry and good Conduct of the Loyal Emigrants; they have them it in every In-Fifty Men killed and wounded.
