P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the 6th of February last, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That notwithstanding any Thing contained in Two Acts passed in the last Session of Parliament, referred to in the said Order, it should be lawful for any Person, residing or being in Great Britain, to pay any Bill drawn or indorsed in any Part of the United Provinces, and sent from the said Provinces on or before the Sixteenth Day of January last; provided such Bill should have been made payable at no greater Distance of Time than Three Months from the Date thereof, or Three Months from Sight thereof, under certain Conditions in the said Order contained:—His Majesty, with the Advice of his Privy Council, is hereby pleased to order, That the Licence so granted by the above recited Order of the Sixth of February last, with respect to the Payment of the Bills therein described, be extended, subject to the Condition mentioned in the said Order, to any Bills, drawn or indorsed in any Part of the United Provinces, and sent from the said Provinces, on or before the said Sixteenth Day of January last, which shall have been made payable at no greater Distance of Time than Five Months from the Date thereof, or Five Months from Sight thereof.
