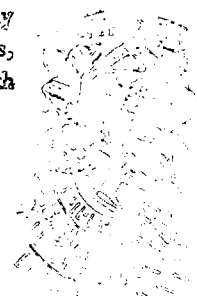
WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man," it is, among many other Things, enacted, That all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain, or any of the Isles beforementioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in such Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner, as has been or shall, from Time to Time, be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by His or Their Order or Orders, made in His or Their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until such Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods and Merchandizes shall have respectively per-

formed and be discharged from such Quarantine, no such Persons, Goods or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on board any other Ship or Vessel, in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence, as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid; and that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on board the same, and all Ships, Vessels, Boats and Persons receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation or published in the London Gazette as aforesaid, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the said Act.

And whereas Information has been received that a malignant and epidemick Fever, of the Nature of the Plague, now prevails in the City of New York, and in the Town of Norfolk in Virginia, within the United States of America; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, judging it probable that the said Infection may be brought into this Kingdom from those Places,

doth thereupon deem it expedient, for the Safety of the Publick Health, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods and Merchandizes now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey Alderney, Sark or Man, from the Ports of New York and of Norfolk in Virginia, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places herein after named shall be and are hereby appointed to be the Places wherein such Ships or Vessels (not having the Infection on board) shall respectively perform Quarantine; that is to say: All Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall perform their Quarantine in Standgate-Creek; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimby; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called Higblake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgwater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ive's, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol or Bridgwater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall perform their Quarantine in Kingroad and Porthate Pill; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks or other Places within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter and Pool, except as herein before excepted, or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein,

shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called St. Ive's Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall perform their Quarantine at a Place called the Mother-Bank, near Portsmouth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstonefs, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkaldy, Anstruther, Preston-Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Inverkeithing Bay; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltoun, Oban, Rothsay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer and Wigtoun, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Lamalsh in the Island of Arran; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Carthorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island, called Belle-Croute, or at some Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England; and all Ships or Vessels which are or shall be bound to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at some Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England.

That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted

as possible; and if any Pilot or other Person shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine, in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares and Merchandizes liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be opened, unpacked and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain a Week, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk raw, thrown or wrought, Linen, Cotton-Wool, Cotton-Yarn or manufactured, Wool raw or any wise wrought, Feathers, Grogam or Mohair Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmentia Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid-Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Sponges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats and Breshes, Matting, and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes, so as aforesaid enumerated, are to be opened, unpacked and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by such Ships and Vessels respectively shall be aired in the following Places, that is to say: All such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall be aired in Standgate Creek; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Lynn, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall be aired in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall be aired in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End thereof; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgwater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracombe or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol or Bridgwater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall be aired in King Road and Porihute Pill; all such Goods as shall be

imported to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members, or Creeks or other Places, within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter and Pool, except as before excepted, or to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall be aired in a Place called St. Ives's Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall be aired at a Place called the Motherbank, near Portsmouth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstoness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkcaldy, Anstruther, Preston-Pans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Inverkeithing Bay; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltoun, Oban, Rothsay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtoun, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Lamalah, in the Island of Arran; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Cromarty Bay, in the Murray Firth; all such Goods as shall be imported to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Carthorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith; all such Goods as shall be imported to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall be aired at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island called Belle Croute, or at such Place hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England, where the Ships in which such Goods are imported shall respectively perform their Quarantine; and all such Goods as shall be imported to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall be aired in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at such Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the

Coast.

Coast of England, where the Ships in which such Goods are imported shall respectively perform their Quarantine.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as, after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Vessel, for the taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection, from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen or Passengers from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care that the Quarantine before directed be duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all the Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

S I R,

BE pleased to acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty I left Gibraltar Bay the 24th of September, taking the first Spirit of an Easterly Wind after my Letter written their Lordships of the 21st of the same Month, when the Wind was westerly.

In coming through the Gut in the Night His Majesty's Ships Argo and Juno, with some of the Ships, parted Company, and, I conclude, by steering more to the Northward than myself with the other Men of War and Body of the Convoy, it being near Dark in the Evening before many got out of Gibraltar Bay, though the Fortitude was under Weigh with the much greater Part by Ten A. M.; but, on the whole, their Separation has turned out a most fortunate Circumstance; for, with great Regret, I am to inform their Lordships, that on the 7th Instant, Cape St. Vincent, by Account, bearing S. 83 E. 48 Leagues, the Wind N. by W. standing on the Larboard Tack, I discovered Nine Sail of the Enemy's Ships, Six of the Line, Two of which I judged to be of 80 Guns, and Three large Frigates, who directly gave Chace to His Majesty's Ships under my Command and Convoy, under a Press of Sail. I made every possible Disposition for the better Security of the Convoy by divers Signals, and which, had many of them been punctually obeyed, a much greater Number would have escaped. I then formed the Line, with the Bedford, Censeur and Fortitude, determined, if possible, to give them Battle, and save as many of the Convoy as I possibly could.

Just as the Ships under my Command had formed, the Censeur rolled away her Fore Topmast; by which, having only a Frigate's Mainmast, she was rendered useless. The Van Line of Battle Ship of the Enemy then but long Gun-Shot off, and the rest coming fast up, I judged it proper, with the general Opinion of my Officers, coincided with that of Captain Montgomery of the Bedford, to bear up, keeping very near together for our mutual Support, and cutting down every Part of the Stern for the Chace Guns. I ordered the Lutine Frigate directly to take the Censeur in tow, but, from the very heavy Fire from the Enemy's Van Ship, it could not be effected.

Captain Gore, who commanded her, though in the disabled State his Ship was in, not half manned, (and but very little Powder) made the most gallant Defence; but being overpowered at last, by Two Sail more of the Enemy's Line coming up, I had the

the Mortification to see him strike his Colours about Half past Two o'Clock.

The Bedford and Fortitude kept up their mutual Fire from their Stern Chaces from all the Decks; and about One Hour afterwards the Enemy hauled their Wind on different Tacks, to fire on the Convoy as they came up with them. The Three Frigates from the first employed themselves on that Service.

When I first made the Enemy's Force to be of such Magnitude as to leave no Hopes of saving the Convoy, I dispersed them by Signal, and I believe many escaped; at least Fifteen Sail I am sure of. For further Particulars I must refer their Lordships to Captain Turner, the Bearer of these Dispatches, who, with Captain Haggett of the Lutine, I must beg Leave to recommend to their Lordships as very deserving Officers.

Had the Enemy come to close Action with the Bedford and myself, I am well assured every Effort would have been used by Captain Montgomery, his Officers and Ship's Company, and more fully so from the handsome Support he gave me while the Firing continued, for His Majesty's Service and our mutual Support.

My Officers and Ship's Company behaved with that Coolness that generally attends British Seamen in such Cases, and I am sure would have fought the Ship to the last Moment, had the Enemy come up. I flatter myself every Thing was done, first to save the Convoy, and afterwards His Majesty's Ships; and I hope and trust my Conduct in this unfortunate Business will meet His Majesty's and their Lordships Approbation.

Extract of a Letter from Sir Peter Parker, Bart. dated Royal William, at Spithead, October 17, 1795, to Evan Nepean, Esq;

SIR,

I Have the Pleasure to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that His Majesty's Ships and Sloop named in the Margin* are arrived at Spithead. I have given Captain Taylor, of the Fortitude, Leave to go to Town to give their Lordships such Particulars of the late Action with the Enemy as they may be desirous of knowing.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Burges to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Argo, off the Needles, October 17, 1795.

SIR,

YOU will please to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty of the Arrival of His Majesty's Ship Argo under my Command, together with the Juno, Lord A. Beauclerk, and Thirty-two Sail of the Convoy, which left Gibraltar Bay on Thursday the 24th of September, under the Fortitude.
