Contemplating the miserable State of France, we are firmly resolved to rally round your Majesty's Throne as the best Safeguard of our Religion, Property and Laws.

Warmly impressed with such Sentiments, which we are satisfied are the Sentiments of the People at large, we implore the Throne of Grace to continue, as it has hitherto done, to shed its saving Influence over your Royal Person, to inspire those who have dared to raise their Hands against it with deep Contrition for their Crime, and every Subject of the Realm with Love and Affection for your Majesty, and with Submission to the Laws.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Burgesses and Commonalty of the City of Bristol, in Common Council assembled,

beg Leave to approach your Majesty, humbly to express our Abhorrence and Indignation at the late daring Insult and outrageous Attempt on your Majesty's Royal Person.

We lament, with the deepest Concern, the Depravity and Wickedness of the Instigators and Promoters of such vile Measures, as well as the Folly of those misguided Persons, who are so far deluded as not only to overlook the solid Advantages they enjoy under your Majesty's mild and paternal Government, but seek and endeavour, by the most insidious Means, to alienate the Minds of your Majesty's Subjects from their Allegiance, and to overturn and destroy our happy Constitution.

We sincerely hope, that the Authors and Abettors of Crimes so atrocious will be speedily discovered and brought to condign Punishment, and that others may be thereby deterred from all similar Attempts.

That your Majesty may long, very long, reign in the Hearts of all your People, and in the Enjoyment of Health, Peace and Happiness, is the sincere Wish and earnest Prayer of your Majesty's faithful Subjects, the Mayor, Burgesses and Commonalty of the City of Bristol.

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, at a General Meeting assembled at the Sessions House for the said County, on Friday the 6th Day of November, 1795.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, truly sensible of the inestimable Blessings we, in common with all your Majesty's faithful Subjects, enjoy under your Majesty's just and mild Government, beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that it is with equal Sorrow and Indignation we perceive that there are any of our Fellow Subjects so lost to every Sentiment of Loyalty, Virtue and Religion, as to be capable of perpetrating the late atrocious Act of Violence against your Majesty's Royal Person.

As Magistrates intrusted with the Exercise of Civil Authority within this opulent County, we desire particularly to express upon this Occasion our Abhorrence and Detestation of that heinous Violation of the public Peace, and Defiance of all legal Government; and we humbly intreat your Majesty to believe, that we will, in our individual as well as in our collective Capacities, exert our utmost Endeavours to discover, and bring to Punishment, the Exciters and Actors in this most horrid and detestable Outrage: That we will use our utmost Vigilance to repress every Attempt to disturb the Public Peace, and to enforce a due Obedience to the Laws, and to protect, as far as we are or may be authorized by Law, the Persons and Properties of all your Majesty's faithful Subjects within our Jurisdiction.
