an Empire in the Hearts of a loyal People; and deeming ourselves competent to form a right Notion of the Superior Excellence of the British Constiturion over all others that in human Wisdom have ever been contrived, or may by modern Reformers be devised, feel ourselves at the present Moment animated with more than our ordinary Zeal to repeat those Declarations of Loyalty and Service, which, upon many previous Occasions, have been tendered by the Inhabitants of this Town and Neighbourhood at the Foot of your Majesty's Throne. we behold with Concern, Sire, a turbulent and factious Spirit predominant in the Hearts of certain illdefigning Men, who, with a rellless Anxiety, are continually endeavouring how to turn afide from their Allegiance the lower Orders of your Majesty's Subjects, and to inflil into their weak and un-guarded Minds Prejudices against your Royal Per-Yon. To fuch nefarious Machinations is the daring Ourrage to be ascribed, which was irreverently and angratefully levelled against your facred Majesty, in your Passage to the House of Lords, tending to the Dishonour of the Royal Dignity of the chief Branch of the Legislature, to the Subversion of the civil and religious Ordinances of the Realin, and to the indecorous Infraction of the high Privileges of Parliament. While we view and lament this Corruption in the Hearts of certain infatuated and mifguidtd Men, we are refolved, as far as lies in our Power, to look forward with a watchful Eye to the Prefervation of the leveral Branches of the Legislature, and to facrifice our Lives and our Fortunes in mai taining il e Unity of a Constitution, which may Le justly deemed the Bulwark of British Freedom, and the Englishman's truest Glory.
