And we eagerly embrace this Opportunity to assure your Majesty of our zealous and steady Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to express our sincere and ardent Wishes, that that venerable and truly excellent Fabric, the British Constitution, of which we conceive the Throne which your Majesty fills to be the Cape Stone, may last unimpaired to the End of Time.

The humble and dutiful Address of the Convener of the Trades and the Deacons of the whole Incorporations of the City of Edinburgh.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Convener of the Trades, and the Deacons of the whole Incorporations of the City of Edinburgh, with the unanimous Concurrence and Approbation of our Constituents, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with Sentiments of sincere Congratulation on the Safety of your Royal Person.

We learned with Surprise and Indignation, that while your Majesty was proceeding, in the Exercise of your Royal Prerogative, to open the Session of your Parliament, a Number of abandoned Men affailed your Majesty's Person with Violence and Outrage, to the imminent Danger of your precious Life. This atrocious Conduct, wholly unfuitable to the Character which British Subjects have long maintained, we can attribute only to those profligate Principles, which daring Innovators have of late laboured to infil into the Minds of ignorant People in feditious Assemblies.

We consider the Outrage which has been offered to your Majesty, in all its Circumstances, as a Blow which has been aimed at the Conflitution of this Country; we bless God that it has failed of its disastrous Purpose; and we trust that this interesting Event, while it excites the Emotions of anxious Attachment to your Majesty as the Father of your People, will confirm all Ranks of Men in their Adherence to the found Principles of good Order and legal Subordination; that it will in its Consequences lead to such Measures as may secure your Majesty's Person and Authority from suture Dangers; and that by the Proofs which this Event involves of Conspiracy against the State, the Zeal of
