We derive, however, no finall Confolation from observing the Satisfaction and Joy that have been teffified on your Majefly's Deliverance from the Defigns of your Enemics; and while we are earned to join in this general Teltimony we shall not case to offer up our Prayers for the Prefervation and long Continuance of your Majelty's Life: Nor will we Sail to promote, as far as in us lies, that Loyalty to your Perfon, which is obligatory upon us both by Duty and Gratitude, and that Reverence for the Laws of our Country, which is abfolutely neceffary, not only to fecure the publick Tranquillity, but to maintain and perpetuate the diffinguithed Pre-eminence which this Nation has to glorioufly and enviably enjoyed.
