Your Majelty may be well affured that nothing wil be wanting on our Parts, as far as in us licth, to defeat all dangerous Defigns against your invaluable Life, as well as every Attempt to diturb er weaken your Majesty's mild and gracious Reign over us: And we most fincerely and devoutly pray to the Almighty Difpofer of all Events, that He would be pleafed to continue your Majefty long, very long, in Health and Safety, till our Ruler and Governor; and that when it shall please Him, in his Divine Wifdom, to separate you from an affectionate People, and to remove you from those Toils and Troubles which are infeparable from an earthly Throne, He may receive you to Himfelf, and tranflate you into a Kingdom of endless Peace, Felicity and Glory.

all the Advantages we enjoy under your Majefty's paternal Care and Protection ; to which alone, under God, we are indebted for them : That the chief Objeft of your Attention is, like that of your Royal Anceftors, the fixing and preferving our Conflitu-tion, both in Church and State, upon the firmeft Batis; and by this Means connecting, what is fcarce ever united in other Kingdoms, the Honour, Influence and Profperity of your Government with the Happinels of your People.

WE, your Majeity's most dutiful and faithful Subjects, the Bifhop, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church, and the Archdeacon and Clergy of the Diocefe of Gloucester, impressed with the deepeil Gratitude to Almighty God for his many providential Interpolitions in Behalf of this Nation, humbly request your Majesty's Acceptance of our warmeft Cougratulations on a new and fignal Inftance of the Divine Goodness, in your Majesty's late De-liverance from a wicked and desperate Attempt, by which the Safety of your Majefty's Perion and of our excellent Conflitution was alike equally endangered.

Instructed by the Example of a neighbouring Kingdom, we wanted not the Evidence of fo daring an Outrage to be thoroughly convinced of the pernicious Tendency of those Doctrines, which have produced in that Country their natural Fruits, Anarchy and Bloodshed; and which have been too fucces-fully employed in corrupting the Morals and exciting a Spirit of Difcontent and Infurrection in the Minds of the lower Orders of the People in every other civilized Government. We cannot, however, but confider it as an awful and inconteftable Proof of the alarming Progrefs which those Principles have made amongst ourselves, and an abundant Justification of the Wildom of the Legislature in deviling other and more effectual Means than the prefeat Laws afford, both for the better Security of your Majefty's Perfon, and for the Suppression of those tumultuous and illegal Meetings, where the facred Name of Liberty is used only as a Cloak of Ma-liciousness, and where the Preachers of Sedition conceal from the deluded Multitude their Defiges of fubverting the Conflictution under the fpecious Pretext of reforming it.

As Ministers of that Religion, which teaches us, at the fame Time, to fear God and to honour the King, we are manifestly required, and will constantly endeavour to inculcate upon the Minds of those committed to our Charge the indifpensable Duties of Loyalty to your Majesty and peaceable Subjection to the established Laws. As Britons, we feel and rejoice in the Bleflings of a free and equal Govern-ment. We are fully apprifed of the inethimable Value of both our religious and civil Liberties ; and warranted, by the uniform Experience of your path Conduct, in believing them to be equally dear to your Majefty, we pray that your Mujelly may long continue to be their fovereign Guardian and Protecter, and that, under the Government of your Royal House, they may be transmitted unimpaired to our latest Posterity.
