

AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 30th of December, 1795,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 12th Day of August last, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, expired upon the 25th Day of this instant December; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Eight Weeks, to commence from the said 25th Day of this instant December, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, except as excepted in His Majesty's former Order in Council of the 12th of August last, and (subject to the Conditions therein expressed.— And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

We farther add our most fervent Prayers to Heaven, that under the same Almighty Protection and Guidance, having become the blessed Instrument of composing those Troubles that now convulse the World, you may see the Love of social Order and Harmony revive among all Nations; and continuing to maintain, unshaken, the Principles of our own unrivalled Constitution, both in Church and State, long reign in Peace and Honour over a loyal, affectionate and religious People.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the Bishop and Clergy of your Majesty's Island of *Mann*, in Concert with your other loyal Subjects, beg Leave to approach your Throne with Sentiments of sincere Concern and Astonishment at the Outrage lately offered to your Majesty's sacred Person in passing to your House of Parliament.

It is with great Regret and Abhorrence we hear that there should exist in your Majesty's Capital even a few Individuals daring enough to avow Principles and perpetrate Acts subversive of all Order and Subordination, and which menace the Dissolution of all political Union.

With the late Occurrences in our View, we cannot help humbly remarking to your Majesty, that in civil Society, when the established Decorums of Life begin to be interrupted, when due Respect is withheld from Personages not more eminent for their Rank than for their Virtues, when the Sovereign Himself becomes the Object of Insult and Menace, Events like these form an awful Period in the Annals of a Kingdom.

Under these Impressions we are anxious to learn that the Disturbers of your Majesty and the Nation be speedily detected and punished; and we shall not fail to solicit the Author of Peace and Lover of Concord to prevent every Return of such alarming Paroxysms of Licentiousness.

We beg Leave most cordially to congratulate your Majesty on your providential Escape from the sanguinary Assaults of malevolent Men, and with all the Ardour becoming our Order we commit your Majesty to God's gracious Guidance and Protection, beseeching Him, by whom "Kings reign, and Princes decree Judgment," that in our Days "He quench not the Light of Israel."
