Carlton House, January 7.

THIS Morning, between Nine and Ten o'Clock, the Princess of Wales was happily delivered of a Princess. His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of His Majesty's Council, his Grace the Duke of Leeds, his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, the Earl of Cholmondeley, Lord Chamberlain, and the Earl of Jersey, Master of the Horse to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Right Honorable Lord Thurlow, and the Ladies of Her Royal Highness's Bedchamber, were present.

Her Royal Highness is, God be praised, as well as can be expected, and the young Princess is in perfect Health.

This happy Event was immediately made known by the Firing of the Tower Guns, and other Demonstrations of Joy in London and Westminster.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 12th Day of August last, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, expired upon the 25th Day of this instant December; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any

Time during the Space of Eight Weeks, to commence from the said 25th Day of this instant December, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be laden or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, except as excepted in His Majesty's former Order in Council of the 12th of August last, and subject to the Conditions therein expressed.— And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
