PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7 HEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that the malignant and epidemic Fever, of the Nature of the Plague, which fome Time fince prevailed in the City of New York, and in the Town of Norfolk in Virginia, within the United States of America, has fubfided, and that Health is perfectly restored to the faid City of New York, and to the faid Town of Norfolk; and that the Communication between those Places and the City of Philadelphia is again opened; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, and being defirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade, fo far as may be confiftent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Order in Council bearing Date the 14th Day of October, 1795, upon all Ships, Veffels, Perfons, Goods and Merchandize arriving from the City of New York, and the Town of Norfolk in Virginia, in the United States of America, be taken off; and that all fuch Ships and Veffels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without unpacking, opening and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in case such Order of the 14th Day of October, 1795, had not been made, any Thing in the faid Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding; provided that the Masters or other Persons having Charge of such Ships or Vessels respectively, do first make Oath before the Custom-House Officer or Chief Magistrate at the Places respectively, at which such respective Ships or Vessels have arrived, or shall arrive, that their Crews are free from all Infection: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treafury, the Commissioners for executing the Oslice of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the Isles of Jersey, Guarnsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentyfecond of July last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, BarIron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant January: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the

should be continued for some Time longer; his Majetty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Twenty-fifth Day of this inflant January, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, paffed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to ena-" ble His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Na-" val Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exof portation of Salt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majefly, or employed or freighted by His Majefly's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of fuch Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa; or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles, for the Purpoles of Trade, to Ire land, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles

DISPATCH, of which the following is an Ex-A tract, has been received from Lieutenant-Co-lonel Craufurd by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department, dated Head Quarters of Marshal Clersaye's Army, Creutzenach, the 21st of December, 1795.

IN consequence of the Advantages obtained by Marshal Clerfaye, as stated in my last, General Jourdan, after having attempted in vain by different Manœuvres to secure the Right of his Army, began his Retreat from the Nahe on the 13th Instant, and on the 15th he took a Position upon the Hunfruck, occupying all the principal Passes between Bacharach on the Rhine, and Trarbach on the Moselle.

From the 15th to the present Date several unimportant Actions have taken Place between the advanced Corps of these Two Armies, and the Austrian Light Troops have at different Times scoured the Country from Birkenfeldt to Treves; but the Strength of the Enemy's Polition in the Mountains, and the Roads that lead to it being rendered fo bad by the late Rains as to make the March of heavy Artillery almost impossible, have prevented Marshall Clerfaye from undertaking any Operation of Confequence. His Excellency's Line now extends from Dreyekhausen on the Rhine, by Stromburg, Kirb, and Oberstein to Birkenfeldt, from whence the Left of his Army is connected by a Chain of Light Troops with Marshal Wurmser's Right, which occupies Kaiferslautern. Marshal Wurmfer has drawn his Line from Kaiserslautern, by Neustadt, along the Rivulet called the Spirebach, to the Rhine.

General Pichegru has made several Attempts to oblige the Austrians to abandon the Post of Kai-ferslautern, and on the 20th Instant he attacked it with very superior Numbers; but, after an Action of feveral Hours, he was completely repulfed, with the Loss of near Two Thousand Men and several Can-

non. The Austrians had, on this Occasion, Twentynine Officers, and between Six and Seven Hundred Non-commissioned Officers and Privates killed and wounded.

The Enemy fometimes make Demonstrations from Duffeldorf, but the Austrian Corps stationed upon the Sieg Rivulet keeps them completely in Check on that Side.

Part of Marshal Wurmser's Army and the Prince of Conde's Corps defend the Right Bank of the Rhine from Philipsbourg to Basse.

Philip Deare, Bernard Cobbe, Inspectors-General of Accounts.

SECTION XVII. And whereas great Losses and Inconveniencies have arifen to the Public, by Sub-Accountants not having been put in Charge till a long Time has elapfed after the Monies were issued to them, be it enacted, That the Paymaster-General of His Majesty's Forces, the Treasurer of the Navy, the Treasurer of the Ordnance, and every other Public Officer who shall hereaster pay into the Hands of any Person or Persons whomsoever, Money for Public Services, by Way of Imprest or on Account, shall, within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty five, and within Thirty Days of the 31st Day of December in every future Year, transmit an Account of all Sums of Money iffued or paid by him or them to any Person or Persons, for the Public Service, within the preceding Year, to the Commissioners to be appointed under the Authority of this Act; who shall, and they are hereby required forthwich to transmit Duplicates of the fame to His Majesty's Remembrancer in the Court of Exchequer, who shall immediately, on Receipt of fuch Accounts, put the feveral Sums fo iffued in Charge against the Parties, in like Manner as is now practifed with respect to Persons who receive Money by Way of Imprest, and on Account, at the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer.

Section XVIII. Provided always, and be it enacted, That no Accountant shall be allowed in his Account any Sum which he shall issue or pay over to any Sub-Accountants, unless he shall have transmitted to the said Commissioners regular Accounts thereof, in the Manner and within the Times abovementioned; unless Proof shall be produced, to the Satisfaction of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of the Treasury, that any Failure of transmitting the same did not happen from the wilful Neglect of the Person issuing or paying over the Money as aforesaid.

SECTION XX. And be it further enacted and declared, That every Sub-Accountant to whom Money shall hereafter be issued for Public Services, in case the Money so issued shall have been for Services to be performed in Great Britain, shall deliver into the Office of the Commissioners to be appointed by virtue of this Act, the Vouchers for the Expenditure-thereof, together with an Account Current, within Three Months of the End of each Year from the Commencement of his Account, unless it has been usual for such Account to be made up to any fixed Period in the Year; in which Case they shall be delivered within Three Months
