SIR,

I Have the Honor of inclosing, for the Information of their Lordships, the Copy of a Letter from me to Sir John Jervis, Knight of the Bath.

Inconstant, at Sea, April 23, 1796.

SIR,

I Have the Honor to inform you, that on the 19th, cruizing near Tunis, I received an Account that a French Frigate had been feen off Cape Mabera, near Bon; I therefore made Sail for that Place, and, on the Evening of the 20th, perceived a Ship under French Colours at Anchor on the Coaft, which I came to, by, and directed to ftrike; this was prudently complied with: She is called L'Unité, a Corvette of 34 Guns and 218 Men. The Crew had made an Attempt to fet her on Fire, but by the Exertions of Lieutenant Hutchinfon it was foon extinguifhed: Had the Ship been of equal Force with the Inconftant, I have every Reafon to believe it would have afforded me a further Proof of the Spirit and Steadinefs of every Officer and Perfon on Board the Ship I command.

Copy of a Letter from Captain N. Tomlinson, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop La Suffisante, to Evan Nepean, Ejq; dated off Falmouth, May 28, 1796.

SIR,

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, for the Information of my Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, that being on a Cruize, in His Majefty's Sloop La Sufifante under my Command, the Lizard bearing N. N. E. Diftance Fifteen Leagues, early Yefterday Morning, we difcovered a Sail, about Six Miles to Windward, and immediately flood for her, and, after a Chace of Eleven Hours, came up with her among the Rocks between Ufhant and the Main, fhe having endeavoured to make her Eleape to Breft through the Paffage Le Four; but I was enabled to cut her off, by the fuperior Sailing of the Suffifante. We engaged her clole on Board for Half an Hour, when fhe firuck, and proves to be the Revanche Brig, Bermudas built, a remarkable fast Sailer, pierced for Fourteen Guns, mounting Twelve long Four-Pounders, and Eighty-five chofen Men, commanded by Montieur George Henri Draveman, Lieutenant de Vaisseau, an old and experienced Seaman. She was Five Days from Havre, bound on a Cruize, but had taken nothing.

I am particularly obliged to the Officers and Crew of the Sufficience, for their and cool and determined Conduct, both in working and fighting the Sloop, when the utmost Exercions were neceffary to prevent the Enemy from efcaping, and to avoid the Rocks by which we were furrounded, on a Lee Shore.

I am happy to add that there was but One Seaman wounded on Board the Suffifante. The Revanche had Two Men killed and Seven wounded. I am now proceeding to Plymouth, in Company with the Prize, and hope we fhall arrive there Tonight.

Extract of a Letter from Commodore Sir John Warren to E-van Nepean, E/q; dated La Pomone, at Sea, May 25, 1796.

I Beg you will inform their Lordfhips, that I on this Day captured La Fantafie, a Republican Privateer, Copper-bottomed, mounting 14 Guns and 75 Men, from Morlaix, on a Cruize. She had been only One Day from the above Port, and had nottaken any Thing.

As feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them : And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to these works are any ways concerned or infrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Infruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again her
