

Four Hours, against the Fort, until Dark, and the Land Wind coming fresh, the Ships were moved off to a proper Anchorage.

The Day following the Army were chiefly employed reconnoitering, and the next Day, from what they had observed and the Intelligence gained, the Enemy were found so exceedingly numerous that it was resolved bet for His Majesty's Service to re-embark the Army, &c. and postpone the Operations for the present.

In the Course of the Night, and by Noon the next Day, the Artillery, Army, &c. were re-embarked; but, I am sorry to add, that the Army lost a few Men, and that the Africa had One Man killed and Seven wounded; and the Leviathan Five killed and Twelve wounded, Two since dead, with Damage done to the Masts and Yards of both Ships, insomuch that they must go down to Jamaica to have them made good.
