

Whitehall, August 6, 1796.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that the Warehouse belonging to the Custom House at Aldburgh, otherwise called Adbro', was, on the Night of the 12th, or early in the Morning of the 13th of July last, feloniously broke open and robbed of Fourteen Bales of Bandannce and Silk Handkerchiefs by certain Persons unknown, who are supposed to have entered the said Warehouse by forcing the Locks thereof with an Iron Crow, and to have carried off the said Goods in a Cart, brought with them for that Purpose, with which they appear to have crossed the Common adjoining to a Field at the Back of the said Warehouse, and to have passed through some Rails Jawn asunder, near the Turnpike Gate, into the London Road, out of which they soon afterwards turned, and are supposed to have taken either the Yoxford or the Yarmouth Road.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Felony and Robbery above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of them who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof
