

East Marsh, to the East of the New Brunswick Dock, at Blackwall, in the Hamlet of Poplar and Blackwall. Newcastle and Haydon-Bridge Canal.

Notice is hereby given, that Application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the ensuing Session, for Leave to bring in a Bill, and to have the same passed into an Act, for making and maintaining a navigable Canal (with proper Towing-Paths) from the Highway called the Bath Lane, otherwise the Back Loaning, near to the Liberties of the Town of Newcastle upon Tyne, to or near to a Bridge over the River Tyne, called Haydon-Bridge; and Three Reservoirs, One in Walbottle Dean, a little North of the Military Road; another on the South Side of Deasly Hill, a little East of Throckley Fell; and a Third at or near Spittal, on a Rivulet running into Whittle Dean; and also Cuts or Feeders from such Reservoirs, to communicate with the said intended Canal; and likewise an inclined Plane or double Railway from the said Canal to the River Tyne, nearly opposite to the West End of the King's Meadows and East of Benwell Staith, with a Wharf at each Extremity of the said inclined Plane or double Railway; which said Canal, Reservoirs, Feeders, and inclined Plane or double Railway, are intended to be carried in, to or through, and to lie within, the several Parishes, Chapelries, and Townships hereinafter named, viz. the Townships of Westgate, Elswick, and Benwell, in the Parish of Saint John; the Townships of East Denton, West
