E N Т, P E S R The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by an Act passed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament, intituled, " An Act " to authorize His Majesty, for a limited Time, to " make Regulations respecting the Trade and Com-" merce to and from the Cape of Good Hope," it is enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majetty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, by any Order or Orders, to be islued from Time to Time, to give fuch Directions, and make fuch Regulations, touching the Trade and Commerce to and from the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, as to His Majefty in Council shall appear most expedient and falutary, any of the Acts of Parliament therein referred to, or any Ufage, Law or Cuftom, to the contrary notwithstanding."

And whereas during the Time the faid Settlement, with the Territories and Dependencies thereof, were in the Poffetfion and under the Government of the States General of the United Provinces, or of the Honorable the General East India Company in the Netherlands, it was ufual to admit the Ships and Veffels belonging to the Subjects of Countries in Amity with the faid United Provinces into the Ports of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, for Repair and Refrefhment, and, with that View, to permit the faid Ships and Veffels to carry on Trade with the Inhabitants of

the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and De pendencies thereof. --- His Majefty is hereby pleafed to order, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majefty by the above recited Act, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful, until further Order, for all Ships and Veffels belonging to His Majefty's Subjects, as well as for all Ships and Vefiels belonging to the Subjects of any Country or State in Amity with His Majesty, to enter into the Ports of the faid Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and to carry on Trade and Traffick with the Inhabitants of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and to import and export to and from the Ports of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, any Goods, Wares or Merchandize whatfoever, fubject to the following Exceptions, and fubject also to fuch Duties, Rules, Regulations and Reftrictions as shall be established by His Majesty, or by the Governor of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, by virtue of Authority derived from His Majefty; and in the mean Time subject to such Duties, Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as subfisted and were in Force before and at the Time of the Conquest of the faid Settlement by the Arms of His Majefty, with fuch Alterations as have been fince made under the Authority of the Commander in Chief of His Majefty's Forces at the faid Settlement: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure that no Goods Wares or Merchandize, which shall be imported into the faid Settlement,

Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies | affembled, beg Leave to approach the Throne, most thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, shall be fubject to any Duty.

And it is His Majefty's Pleafure, that no Goods, Wares or Merchandize, the Growth, Produce or Manufacture of the Countries to the Eastward of the Cape of Good Hope, be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the United Company of Merchants trading to the East Indies; and that no fuch Goods, Wares or Merchandize, be permitted to be exported from thence, except for Sea Stores only, or by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or by their Licence.

But it is His Majesty's Pleasure that nothing in this Order contained shall extend to prevent Ships or Veffels employed in the Southern Whale Fishery from carrying on the fame in fuch and the fame Manner as might have been done if this Order had not been made.

And it is also His Majesty's Pleasure, that no Arms or Artillery, Gunpowder or Aminunition, of any Sort, be allowed to be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the faid United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or by Licence from His Majefty.

And it is His Majesty's further Pleasure, that the Trade and Commerce to and from the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, shall be subject to such of the Laws of Trade and Navigation as would have affected the fame if this Order had not been made, except fo far as fuch Laws are contrary to this prefent Order.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majelly's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the neceflary Directions herein as to them may refpectively appertain.

WE, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Sub-jects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Com-

humbly to thank your Majefty for your gracious Communication to both Houses of Parliament of the Meafures adopted by your Majesty on the recent Manifeito of the Court of Madrid, abruptly declaratory of an unprovoked War with Great Britain.

Your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London fincerely lament that your Majelty's Endeavours to preferve Peace with Spain, and to adjust all Matters in Discussion with that Court by an amicable Negotiation, have been rendered ineffectual, and the Calamities of War thus unavoidably extended.

Nevertheless, relying on the Justice of your Majesty's Cause, the Resources of the Country, the Wifdom of your Majesty's Councils, and the Bravery of your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, we doubt not that, under the Protection of Divine Providence, your Majesty will be able to repel this unprovoked Aggreffion, to fubdue all your Enemies, and finally to obtain the Bleffings of Peace, to fecure the Dignity of your Majeity's Crown, and to advance the Prosperity of these Kingdoms.

We humbly beg Leave to asure your Majesty, that we have Hearts to feel and Understandings to comprehend the paternal Care and benevolent Principles which have influenced your Majefty's recent mons of the City of London, in Common Council | Endeavours to reftore Peace to these Realms, and to put

put a Stop to the further Effusion of human Blood.] We fincerely regret, as the Friends of Humanity, We are the Failure of your Majelty's Efforts. thoroughly imprefied with a Senie of the Moderaation and Good Faith difplayed in your Majefty's pacifick Overtures, and we deeply relent the Indignity offered to the Throne, and to our national Honour, by the infolent and abrupt Rejection of them on the Part of the Enemy. We rely, however, with the utmost Confidence, that the superintending Goodness of Divine Providence will enable your Majefty, by the Vigour, and Energy of your Go-vernment, and the Unanimity and Valour of our Countrymen and Allies, to repel the Danger threatened to Europe, and that, animated by the Spirit of our Anceftors, our Struggles, however arduous, will be crowned with Succefs. PLEASE to inform my Lord Commiffioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Sloop the Hazard has captured a fine coppered French Ship Privateer, La Musette, of Twenty-two Guns and One Hundred and Fifty Men.

In this last Cruize she had, about Thirty Leagues Westward of Cape Clear, taken Two Vessels, one of which, the Abbey, of Liverpool, from Lilbon to Liverpool, is recaptured, and just brought in by His Majesty's Ship Daphne.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Barton, of His Ma-jefty's Ship Lapwing, to Evan Nepean, Efg; dated in Baffeterre Roads, December 3, 1796.

SIR,

A Packet leaving this Place To-Day for England, I embrace the Opportunity, for the Satisfaction of their Lordships, to acquaint them, that I anchored at St. Kitt's on the 25th Ultimo, when an Express Boat had been fent from the Island of Anguilla, to inform the Admiral that the Island was attacked by Two French Men of War and feveral fmall Veffels, containing Four Hundred Troops. I felt it my Duty (as the Express Boat returned here with the Lofs of her Main-Maft) to leave the Service I was ordered on to endeavour to relieve that Place. The Wind, being to the Northward, prevented my getting up there in Time to ftop them from burning the Town; but I have the Pleafure to fay, after an Action of near Two Hours, I effectually relieved that Island, by taking the Ship and sinking the Brig. The Ship proved to be Le Decius, mounting Twenty-four Six-Pounders, Two Twelve-Pound Carronades, and Two Brais Field-Pieces, with One Hundred and Thirty-three Men of her own Complement, aad Two Hundred and Three Troops, commanded by Citoyen Andrée Senis, and the Brig La Vaillante, mounting Four Twenty-four-Pounders, with Forty-five Men and Ninety Troops, commanded by Citoyen Laboutique. The Particulars of the Action I have transmitted to Rear-Admiral Harvey, for the Information of their Lordfhips.
