P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to authorize His Majesty, for a limited Time, to make Regulations respecting the Trade and Commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope," it is enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, by any Order or Orders, to be issued from Time to Time, to give such Directions, and make such Regulations, touching the Trade and Commerce to and from the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any of the Acts of Parliament therein referred to, or any Usage, Law or Custom, to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas during the Time the said Settlement, with the Territories and Dependencies thereof, were in the Possession and under the Government of the States General of the United Provinces, or of the Honorable the General East India Company in the Netherlands, it was usual to admit the Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of Countries in Amity with the said United Provinces into the Ports of the said Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, for Repair and Refreshment, and, with that View, to permit the said Ships and Vessels to carry on Trade with the Inhabitants of

the said Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof. — His Majesty is hereby pleased to order, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by the above recited Act, and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful, until further Order, for all Ships and Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, as well as for all Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of any Country or State in Amity with His Majesty, to enter into the Ports of the said Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and to carry on Trade and Traffick with the Inhabitants of the said Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and to import and export to and from the Ports of the said Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, any Goods, Wares or Merchandize whatsoever, subject to the following Exceptions, and subject also to such Duties, Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be established by His Majesty, or by the Governor of the said Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, by virtue of Authority derived from His Majesty; and in the mean Time subject to such Duties, Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as subsisted and were in Force before and at the Time of the Conquest of the said Settlement by the Arms of His Majesty, with such Alterations as have been since made under the Authority of the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at the said Settlement: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure that no Goods Wares or Merchandize, which shall be imported into the said Settlement,

Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, shall be subject to any Duty.

And it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that no Goods, Wares or Merchandize, the Growth, Produce or Manufacture of the Countries to the Eastward of the Cape of Good Hope, be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the United Company of Merchants trading to the East Indies; and that no such Goods, Wares or Merchandize, be permitted to be exported from thence, except for Sea Stores only, or by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or by their Licence.

But it is His Majesty's Pleasure that nothing in this Order contained shall extend to prevent Ships or Vessels employed in the Southern Whale Fishery from carrying on the same in such and the same Manner as might have been done if this Order had not been made.

And it is also His Majesty's Pleasure, that no Arms or Artillery, Gunpowder or Ammunition, of any Sort, be allowed to be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the said United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or by Licence from His Majesty.

And it is His Majesty's further Pleasure, that the Trade and Commerce to and from the said Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, shall be subject to such of the Laws of Trade and Navigation as would have affected the same if this Order had not been made, except so far as such Laws are contrary to this present Order.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THIS Day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Common Council of the City of London, waited upon His Majesty (being introduced by the Marquis of Salisbury, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household) with the following Address, which was read by Sir John William Rose, the Recorder.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council

assembled, beg Leave to approach the Throne, most humbly to thank your Majesty for your gracious Communication to both Houses of Parliament of the Measures adopted by your Majesty on the recent Manifesto of the Court of Madrid, abruptly declaratory of an unprovoked War with Great Britain.

Your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London sincerely lament that your Majesty's Endeavours to preserve Peace with Spain, and to adjust all Matters in Discussion with that Court by an amicable Negotiation, have been rendered ineffectual, and the Calamities of War thus unavoidably extended.

Nevertheless, relying on the Justice of your Majesty's Cause, the Resources of the Country, the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, and the Bravery of your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, we doubt not that, under the Protection of Divine Providence, your Majesty will be able to repel this unprovoked Aggression, to subdue all your Enemies, and finally to obtain the Blessings of Peace, to secure the Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and to advance the Prosperity of these Kingdoms.

I Receive with great Satisfaction this loyal Address from My City of London.

I sincerely lament the Failure of My Endeavours to preserve Peace with Spain: But, from the Justice of My Cause, the experienced Valour of My Fleets and Armies, and the spirited and generous Exertions of the Nation at large, I trust, under the Protection of the Divine Providence, that this Aggression will be effectually repelled; and that the Blessings of Peace will be restored, upon Terms consistent with the Honour of My Crown, and with the Security and Interests of My People.

They were all received very graciously, and had the Honour to kiss His Majesty's Hand.

After which His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on William Herne, Esq; Alderman.

THE following Address has been presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, Inhabitants and Visitors of the City of Bath, feel it our Duty, at this momentous Crisis, which has fully disclosed the extravagant Ambition of our Enemies, in their Designs to subvert the Liberties of Europe, and the Power and Independence of this Country in particular, and when they have audaciously attempted an Invasion of the Sister Kingdom, to renew our Professions of Attachment to your Royal Person, and to the Constitution under which we have the Happiness to live.

We humbly beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we have Hearts to feel and Understandings to comprehend the paternal Care and benevolent Principles which have influenced your Majesty's recent Endeavours to restore Peace to these Realms, and to

put

put a Stop to the further Effusion of human Blood. We sincerely regret, as the Friends of Humanity, the Failure of your Majesty's Efforts. We are thoroughly impressed with a Sense of the Moderation and Good Faith displayed in your Majesty's pacifick Overtures, and we deeply resent the Indignity offered to the Throne, and to our national Honour, by the insolent and abrupt Rejection of them on the Part of the Enemy. We rely, however, with the utmost Confidence, that the superintending Goodness of Divine Providence will enable your Majesty, by the Vigour and Energy of your Government, and the Unanimity and Valour of our Countrymen and Allies, to repel the Danger threatened to Europe, and that, animated by the Spirit of our Ancestors, our Struggles, however arduous, will be crowned with Success. We beg Leave to express our Determination to support your Majesty, with a steady Zeal, in the Prosecution of the just and inevitable Contest which the Pride and Haughtiness of our Enemies compel us to prolong. We will, readily and cheerfully, submit to such farther Burthens as the Exigencies of the War may require, and the Legislature shall, in it's Wisdom, think necessary to impose; and we are satisfied that we speak the Voice of an united People, with whose general Sentiments and Dispositions, in the various and most distant Parts of the Empire from which we are assembled, we have Opportunities of being well informed.

Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Kingsmill, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Cork, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated L'Engageante, Cork Harbour, January 2, 1797.

PLEASE to inform my Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Sloop the Hazard has captured a fine coppered French Ship Privateer, La Mufette, of Twenty-two Guns and One Hundred and Fifty Men.

In this last Cruize she had, about Thirty Leagues Westward of Cape Clear, taken Two Vessels, one of which, the Abbey, of Liverpool, from Lisbon to Liverpool, is recaptured, and just brought in by His Majesty's Ship Daphne.

LES Deux Amis French Privateer, of Fourteen Guns and Eighty Men, a fine coppered Schooner of about One Hundred Tons, is just arrived, Prize to His Majesty's Ships Polyphemus and Apollo.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Barton, of His Majesty's Ship Lapwing, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated in Basseterre Roads, December 3, 1796.

S I R,

A Packet leaving this Place To-Day for England, I embrace the Opportunity, for the Satisfaction of their Lordships, to acquaint them, that I anchored at St. Kitt's on the 25th Ultimo, when an Express Boat had been sent from the Island of Anguilla, to inform the Admiral that the Island was attacked by Two French Men of War and several small Vessels, containing Four Hundred Troops. I felt it my Duty (as the Express Boat returned here with the Loss of her Main-Mast) to leave the Service I was ordered on to endeavour to relieve that Place. The Wind, being to the Northward, prevented my getting up there in Time to stop them from burning the Town; but I have the Pleasure to say, after an Action of near Two Hours, I effectually relieved that Island, by taking the Ship and sinking the Brig. The Ship proved to be Le Decius, mounting Twenty-four Six-Pounders, Two Twelve-Pound Carronades, and Two Brass Field-Pieces, with One Hundred and Thirty-three Men of her own Complement, and Two Hundred and Three Troops, commanded by Citoyen Andrée Senis, and the Brig La Vaillante, mounting Four Twenty-four-Pounders, with Forty-five Men and Ninety Troops, commanded by Citoyen Laboutique. The Particulars of the Action I have transmitted to Rear-Admiral Harvey, for the Information of their Lordships.
