of incurring the Forfeitures, inflicted by an Act passed | in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act " for indemnifying all Perfons who have been con-" cerned in advising or carrying into Execution an " Order of His Majefty in Council respecting the " Exportation of Rock Salt; for preventing Suits " in confequence of the fame; for authorizing His " Majefly to prohibit the Exportation or carrying " Coaffwife of Rock Salt; and for making further " Provisions relative thereto ;" His Majesty, neverhelefs, by the Advice aforefaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwife under the usual Rules, Regulations and Reftrictions, nor the Exportaion of the fame to Ireland, or to any other of His Majefty's Dominions, under the ufual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given, by the Exporter and Two other Perfons, (of whom the Maiter of the Vessel shall be one) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the faid Rock Salt shall be exported to fome Port or Place in His Majeity's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if fuch Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, and within Twelve Months if for any Part of His Majeity's Dominions in America or the West Indics, and within Eighteen Months if for any of the Britith Settlements or Factories in Afia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Cultoms at the Port or Place where fuch Rock Salt shall be fo landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Cuftoms, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, teitifying that the faid Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the fame was entered out. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respec-Steph. Letter, of which the following is an Extract, has been received from Colonel Craufurd by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majefty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, dated Franckfort, April 19, 1797.

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that General Hoche Yesterday attacked, with very superior Numbers, and defeated an Austrian Corps, commanded by General Kray, which formed a Part of the Army of the Lower Rhine, under the Orders of General Werneck, and was stationed at Thurdorf, on the Road leading from Neuwied to Hackenburg. In confequence of that Circumstance, General Werneck, who was with the principal Part of his Army near Crobach, between Hackenburg and Altenkirchen, has determined to retreat.

Vienna, April 15, 1797.

Accounts have been received this Day of the Enemy having been obliged to abandon the Town and Port of Fiume, with confiderable Lofs, on the 10th Instant.

Vienna, April 16, 1797.

Accounts were received here this Day, from Major-General Baron Laudohn, dated at Trent the

12th Instant, flating, that he had driven the Enemy from Rovoredo, Torbole and Riva, and had occupied those Places. On this Occasion he took from the Enemy several Magazines, (amongst which was One of Powder) 12 Pieces of Cannon, and 400 Prisoners.

Vienna, April 17, 1797.

The Preparations for Defence are continuing here with uncommon Vigour. An intrenched Camp is forming on the *Wienerberg*, on the Italian Road, at a little Diftance from the Lines; and the Works are continuing quite round the Town. The First Divifion of the Troops from the Rhine, accompanied by the Prince of Orange, is already arrived, as is a Part of Monf. de Seckendorf's Corps.

This Morning the numerous Corps of Volunteers of the Town were affembled on the Glacis, and afterwards marched to the circumjacent Villages, where they will be flationed. Their Regularity and good Conduct do them infinite Honor, and the happieft Spirit of Loyalty is manifested by all Classes here.
