Upon entering the Chapel, the ſeveral Perſons in the Proceſſion were conducted to the Places appointed for them; Their Majeſties to Their Chairs of State, and the reſt of the Royal Family to the Seats prepared for them on the Haut-Pas.

At the Concluſion of the Marriage Service, Their Majeſties retired to their Chairs of State under the Canopy, where they remained while the Anthem was performing. The Proceſſion afterwards returned in the following Order :

Maſter of the Ceremonies, with the Chief Officers of the Bridegroom.

The Bridegroom's Gentleman of Honor, between Two Heralds.

The Bridegroom, attended by the Two Dukes as before.

Officers of the Bridegroom.

The Bride's Gentleman of Honor, between the Two Provincial Kings of Arms.

The Bride, ſupported by Their Royal Highneſſes the Duke of Clarence and Prince Ernest-Auguſtus, her Train borne as before.

Their Majeſties and the reſt of the Royal Family were attended in the ſame Manner in which they went to Chapel.

The Proceſſion, at the Return, filed off in the Privy Chamber. Their Majeſties, the Bride and Bridegroom, with the reſt of the Royal Family, and the Great Officers, proceeded into the Levee Chamber, where the Registry of the Marriage was atteſted with the uſual Formalities : After which the Proceſſion was reſumed, and continued into the Leſſer Drawing-Room ; and their Majeſties, with the reſt of the Royal Family, paſſed into the Great Council Chamber, where the Great Officers, Nobility, Foreign Miniſters, and other Perſons of Diſtinction, paid their Compliments on the Occaſion ; which were alſo received by the Bride and Bridegroom in Her Majeſty's Apartments.
