Our Expressions of Congratulation would be mixed with those of Regret on the Removal of so bright an Example from our Conntry, if so many similar Instances did not yet remain within the Circle of your Majesty's daily Observation of Personages, whose Virtues are an Ornament to the Female Character in general, and to your Majesty's Royal Family in particular.

May your Majefly, together with our most gracious Queen, long live to reap the Fruits of your Vigilance and Care, in having circulated by Precept and illustrated by Example, those Virtues which not only add Stability and Dignity to your Majefly's Throne, but extend the Honour of your Majefly's august Family, wherever the Name of the illustrious House of Brunswick is known or mentioned.

And may your Majefty's loyal and affectionate Subjects have the Comfort of beholding every Event take Place which may contribute to establish the Peace, secure the Westare, and confirm the Happiness of your Majesty and your Kingdoms.
