The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and de-

clare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirtieth Day of August next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. *W. To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Justices of the Peace and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Stirling, assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Justices of the Peace and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Stirling, assembled, beg Leave to approach the Throne

Throne with our most sincere Congratulations upon the Suppression of that mutinous and rebellious Spirit, which has disgraced that Part of your Majesty's Fleet lately at the Nore.

Daring and evil-minded Persons have betrayed the open Frankness and Candour of British Seamen, who, in returning to their Duty, will reflect upon their past Conduct with Contrition and Remorse. The Generosity of the Nation, so lately evinced, and so graciously received, should have proved to the Seamen, the natural Bulwarks of their Country, the Sincerity of our Regards, while the liberal Conduct of Parliament, and the steady and determined Resolution of your Majesty's Ministers, supported by the unanimous Sentiments of a loyal People, who will teach the Traitor to his Country that he cannot violate the Constitution, or insult the Laws with Impunity. To protect which, most gracious Sovereign, and your Majesty's Authority, we will most readily devote ourselves either against the internal Attacks of insidious Assassins, or the less dangerous and open Violence of external Foes.

That your Majesty may reign long and happy over a free, a loyal and united People, is our most ardent Prayer.

S I R,

PLEASE to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that Captain Parker, of His Majesty's Ship Santa Margarita, has just sent in a very fine Spanish Privateer Brig, named San Francisco, alias Los Amigos, pierced for 14 Guns, and 53 Men, which he captured on the 21st Instant, on this Coast, off the Durleys, by her venturing too near. She is from St. Sebastian's, and had cruised Twenty Days between Scilly and Cape Clear, but luckily the Frigate was the only English Ship she met with since her being out. She sails remarkably well, is quite new, and might have done much Mischief.

ENCLOSED is a letter from Lieutenant Thomas Newton, commanding the Telemachus Cutter, giving an Account of his having Yesterday captured the French Privateer Le Succés, of Six Guns, and Forty-two Men.

Telemachus Cutter, Spithead, June 29, 1797.

S I R,

I Have to inform you, that Yesterday Afternoon, the Needle Point bearing N. by E. about Five Leagues, I chased and captured the Succés French Lugger Privateer, mounting Six Carriage Guns, Two of which she threw overboard in the Chase, and Forty-two Men; came out the Night before from La Hougue, and had taken Nothing.

I Enclose a Report from Lieutenant Pengelley, commanding His Majesty's Cutter the Viper, relating his Capture of a Spanish Privateer.

Viper, Gibraltar Bay, April 30, 1797.

S I R,

HAVING received Orders from Captain Bowen (of His Majesty's Ship Terpsichore) to proceed with His Majesty's Cutter under my Command to Algiers, upon my Return to Gibraltar on the 13th Ult. being about Seven Leagues N. W. from Alboran,

zan, I fell in with and gave Chace to a Brig in the N. W. Quarter; at One P. M. I fired a Gun, when she hoisted Spanish Colours, and fired a Gun shotted, nove-to, and gave us a Broadside; at Half past One we came close alongside of her, and brought her to Action, which continued till Ten Minutes past Three, when she hauled down her Colours. During the Action she attempted several Times to set us on Fire, by endeavouring to throw on Board us Flasks filled with Powder and Sulphur. She is called the Piteous Virgin Maria, mounting Ten Carriage Guns, Four Six and Six Four Pounders, with Eight Swivels; had on Board at the Commencement of the Action Forty-two Men, and had been from Malaga Six Days.

I am happy to inform you that I lost no Men during the Action; the Enemy had One killed and Seven wounded dangerously, One of which is since dead. The Cutter received Forty Shot in the Main-Sail, and her Rigging was very much damaged and cut to Pieces; a Four-Pound Shot is lodged in her lower Mast. In Justice to the Officers and Men I beg Leave to observe, that they respectively did their Duty to my entire Satisfaction.

Extract of a Letter from the Earl St. Vincent, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed on the Coast of Portugal, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board the Ville de Paris, off Cadix, May 28, 1797.

ON the Morning of the 24th Instant, a Brig Corvette was observed approaching the Squadron, under Spanish Colours, and the Signal was made for the Romulus and Mahonesa to take Possession of her; they run along-side her, under Spanish Colours, and the Mistake was not discovered until they hoisted English, by which Means the Nuestra Senora del Rosario, of Twenty Guns and One Hundred Men, commanded by Don Juan Antonio de Carega, was captured without a Shot fired.

S I R,

YOU will please to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty of my having captured this Day, Ten Leagues to the Eastward of Yarmouth, a French Lugger Privateer, named the Poisson Volant, mounting Fourteen Carriage Guns and Fifty Men; the Guns were thrown overboard during the Chace, and Twenty-eight of the Men were in Two Prizes (a Ship and a Brig) she had taken some Days before off Buckiness.

The Lugger is quite new, well found, and sails fast; left Havre de Grace Eighteen Days since.
