Copy of a Letter from Admiral Peyton, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Downes, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board the Overysel, the 9th Instant.

S I R,

I Herewith enclose a Copy of a Letter I have received from Captain Horton, of His Majesty's Sloop Fairy, giving an Account of his having sunk a French Lugger, which you will please to lay before their Lordships.

On Board His Majesty's Sloop Fairy, the 8th of October, at Sea.

S I R,

I Have to inform you, that on the 5th, at Day-Break, being off Blancnez, I discovered Three Luggers to the S. W. and One Brig to the Westward, which proved to be a Prize to them; and, after every Effort to cut them off from the Land proving unsuccessful, about Eleven A. M. a little to the Westward of Estaples, I anchored abreast of the Brig, one of the Luggers having regained her, and, after heaving as close in as I could, and attempting to drive the Lugger's Crew, Soldiers and People assembled about the Brig from her, as well as having sent my Boats in twice to see if it was practicable to board the Brig, in vain, I was under the Necessity of leaving the Brig, though not before I had the Satisfaction to sink the Lugger, which, from the Manner they dismantled her at low Water, I conceive to have rendered totally unserviceable.

As the Tide flowed the Enemy moved the Brig close in Shore under the Batteries, and got her into Bologne.

The Lugger appeared to have from 30 to 40 Men on Board, mounted Swivels only.

I Have to acquaint you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that Yesterday, at Four A. M. Caskets Lights bearing South

South Six Leagues, after a Chace of Four Hours, we captured Le Rayon, a French Privateer Luggier, mounting 6 Carriage Guns and 8 Cohorns, and 54 Men, commanded by Jean Baptiste Leonard Goffelin. She sailed from Cherburgh Ten Hours before, on a Six Weeks Cruize, between the Lizard and Cape Clear, was well appointed, and sails remarkably fast.

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that the Unité last Night captured a French Brig Privateer, called La Brunette, pierced for 16 Guns and carrying 10, (8 of which were thrown overboard in Chace) and 80 Men.

La Brunette had sailed from Bourdeaux only Two Days, and is completely fitted for a long Cruize.
