Copy of a Letter from Captain Charles Rowley, Commander of His Majesty's Ship *Unité*, to the Right Honorable Lord Bridport, K. B. dated at Sea, the 9th Instant.

My Lord,

I Have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship, that, in Latitude 46 deg. 10 min. North, and Longitude 5 deg. 35 min. West, I captured the National Corvette *De Couverté*, of 14 Guns and 90 Men, commanded by Mons. Martineq, Lieutenant de Vaisseau, Four Days from Nantz, charged with secret Dispatches, which he threw overboard, with Ten of her Guns, in the Chace.
