THE following Addreses having been transmitted to the Duke of Portland, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Grace presented to the King; which Addreses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most faithful and dutiful Subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates and Town Council of the City of Glasgow, beg Leave to approach your Throne with most sincere and heartfelt Congratulations on the late Victory obtained over the Navy of Holland by your Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Admiral Lord Viscount Duncan; a Victory, which, whether viewed in it's important National Consequences, or in the able Conduct and Gallantry by which it was gained, is inferior to none that stand recorded in the Annals of British Naval Glory.

In the present Crisis of Public Affairs, when our Enemies have insolently refused to treat with your Majesty for restoring Peace to your Kingdoms, upon such moderate and liberal Terms as, after the brilliant Success of your Majesty's Arms in every Quarter of the Globe, could only be dictated by your Paternal Love to your People, and an earnest Desire to relieve Europe from the Horrors of War; we conceive it to be our Duty to renew to your Majesty our most solemn Assurances of Loyalty and Attachment to your Person and Government, and our firm Resolution with our Lives and Fortunes to defend our Liberty, Civil and Religious, as established by our happy Constitution.

We trust that your Majesty, by the Favour of Divine Providence, and the Assistance of your loyal Subjects, will be enabled to make such Exertions in the Prosecution of this unavoidable War, as will secure to your Kingdoms an honorable and lasting Peace.

That your Majesty may long reign over a free and happy People, and may transmit to your own, and your Subjects latest Posterity, the Blessings which have flowed from your mild and auspicious Government, is our most fervent Prayer.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the Borough of Berwick upon Tweed.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the Borough of Berwick upon Tweed, in Guild assembled, humbly beg Leave to approach your Throne, and to join the general Voice of your People in congratulating your Majesty upon the late glorious and important Victory obtained by your Majesty's Fleet,

under the Command of Admiral Lord Viscount Duncan, over that of the Dutch, on the Coast of Holland.

Permit us, Royal Sire, to assure you, that we will, with chearful Hearts, contribute our best Assistance, and execute every Duty, even to the Sacrifice of our Lives and Fortunes, in the Support of your Majesty and your August Family upon the Throne of these Kingdoms, and towards carrying on, with Vigor, the War in which your Majesty is so indispensably engaged, in Defence of the Religion, Laws, Liberties Commerce, and the just Rights of the British Nation.

Given under our Common Seal the 23d Day of November, in the Thirty-eighth Year of our Reign.
