HE following Addreffes having been tranf-mitted to the Duke of Portland, His Majefty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Grace prefented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very gracioufly.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most faithful and dutiful Subjects, the Lord Provoft, Magistrates and Town Council of the City of Glafgow, beg Leave to approach your Throne with most fincere and heartfelt Congratulations on the late Victory obtained over the Navy of Holland by your Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Admiral Lord Viscount Duncan; a Victory, which, whether viewed in it's important National Confequences, or in the able Conduct and Gallantry by which it was gained, is inferior to none that stand recorded in the Annals of British Naval Glory.

In the prefent Crifis of Public Affairs, when our Enemies have infolently refused to treat with your Majefty for reftoring Peace to your Kingdoms, upon fuch moderate and liberal Terms as, after the bril-liant Succefs of your Majesty's Arms in every Quarter of the Globe, could only be dictated by your Paternal Love to your People, and an earnest Defire to relieve Europe from the Horrors of War; we conceive it to be our Duty to renew to your Majefty our most folemn Assurances of Loyalty and Attachment to your Perfon and Government, and our firm Refolution with our Lives and Fortunes to defend our Liberty, Civil and Religious, as established by our happy Constitution.

We truft that your Majesty, by the Favour of Divine Providence, and the Affiftance of your loyal Subjects, will be enabled to make fuch Exertions in the Profecution of this unavoidable War, as will fecure to your Kingdoms an honorable and lafting Peace.

That your Majefly may long reign over a free and happy People, and may transmit to your own, and your Subjects lateft Pofterity, the Bleffings which have flowed from your mild and aufpicious Government, is our most fervent Prayer.
