P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant

December; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant December to the Twenty-eighth Day of February next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

A Letter, of which the following is an Extract, has been received from Peter Le Mesurier, Esq; Governor of the Island of Alderney, by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, dated Alderney, the 25th of December, 1797.

I Have the Honor of informing you, that Yesterday Afternoon, at Three o'Clock, a French Curcer Privateer had the Boldness to chase the Ann Cutter, of Hastings, close under one of our Batteries, which she was just on the Point of Boarding with her Boat, when the Battery opened and obliged the French to steer off.

Having observed that the English Vessel outfailed the Enemy whilst there was a Breeze, and that the Privateer was not of great Force, I judged it probable that she might be captured by the Troops of the Garrison, and therefore ordered a Detachment, with an Officer, to embark in the same Vessel that had been chased, and in another, that fortunately happened to be in the Road, having previously promised some Gratuity to the Owners, and in a few Hours I learned, with much Satisfaction, that the Privateer was brought into our Harbour.

She proves to be the Epervier, Captain Fierce, with 24 Men, mounting 3 Guns, 2 Swivels, and Small Arms, belonging to Dunkirk, but fitted out from Cherburgh, on a Fortnight's Cruize from the 17th Instant; had, on the 21st, taken the Brig Ann, Le Hirrel, Master, from Galpe to Jersey, with

with Fish, and Yesterday Morning a small Vessel bound from hence to Edgland, both which Captures had been noticed from this Island.

I cannot too much praise the Readiness and Alacrity shewn by Major Gordon, the Officers and Soldiers of the Garrison, in the Execution of my Orders on this Occasion; for the Day was so far spent that One Quarter of an Hour's Delay might have frustrated all our Exertions; but I am in Duty bound to testify my particular Obligations to Town-Major Hainell, who solicited to be employed, and instantaneously embarking, effected the Capture without any Loss.

I am further happy in reporting, that our Battery was well served, as out of Three Shot fired within Reach, One passed through the Enemy's Sails, and another killed a Man on Board.

*Extract of a Letter from Captain Edward Griffith, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Niger, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Spithead the 26th Ultimo.*

**Y**ESTERDAY, the Start Point bearing North about Seven Leagues, I captured, after a few Hours Chace, the Delphine, a French Privateer Cutter, pierced for 10 Guns, 4 mounted, and 38 Men on Board. She sailed from St. Maloes Six Days ago, in Company with a Lugger; had captured the Active Brigantine, of Jersey, and had been beat off the Night before we fell in with her by an English Letter of Marque.

**Y**OU will be pleased to inform the Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 28th Instant, the Spurn Point bearing W. N. W. distant Four Leagues, I captured, after a Chace of Four Hours, the French Privateer Schooner Le Victoire, of 14 Guns and 74 Men. She had been out Ten Days, had captured Two Colliers, and was in Pursuit of an English Merchantman when I first discovered her.

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Provost, Magistrates and Town Council, and Deacons of Crafts, of the Burgh of Lanark, beg Leave to approach the Throne to express our unfeigned Joy, and to offer our sincere Congratulations to your Majesty, on the Success

which has attended your Majesty's Fleet, under the Command of Admiral Lord Viscount Duncan, and the fair Prospect of decisive good Consequences which, under Divine Providence, must necessarily follow this important Naval Victory.

While we lament the Continuance of the War, and that your Majesty's gracious Endeavours to put an End to the Calamities attending it, have been frustrated by the Ambition and overbearing Spirit of our Enemies, we at the same Time feel the strongest Indignation at the insolent Manner in which your Majesty's gracious Overtures for Peace have been rejected, which must of Course produce Unanimity at Home, founded on a Conviction of the Justice and Necessity of your Majesty's Measures in the Prosecution of the War, in the Vindication of the Honour of your Crown, and the Rights and Liberties of your People.

With Hearts full of Gratitude we acknowledge the Happiness which we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Reign, fully convinced of the Uprightness of your Majesty's Government, and most firmly attached to your Majesty's Person and Family, we therefore humbly hope that such Measures may be adopted and continued until Peace shall be obtained, consistent with the Honour, the Safety, and true Interests of Great Britain, which is the earnest Prayer of,
