W Hereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that on the Evening of Tuesday the 2d Instant a Straw-House, Cow-House, Fatting-House, some Pigflies, a Cart-Howel, Part of Two Ricks of Hay, a Cow, and some Farming Utensils, (the Value of the whole of which is estimated at Two Hundred Pounds or upwards) were burnt on a Farm situated near the Town of Woburn in the County of Bedford, and in the Occupation of John Circuit, of the Said Town; and that the Said Premises were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown.

It has likewise been humbly represented to the King, that on the Evening of Monday the 8th Instant, a thatched Workshop, situated in the Town of Woburn aforesaid, and in the Occupation of John Evans, Collar-Maker, was discovered to be on Fire; but that the Flames, having been timely perceived, were speedily extinguished by the Inhabitants of the said Town; and that in some Thatch which had been stripped off the faid Shop a Piece of Cotton or fine. Wool, mixed with Greafe or Oil, was found, partly consumed.

And it has been further humbly represented to the King, that on the Evening of Tuesday the 9th Instant, a thatched Wood Barn, (containing Coals, Wood, old Paper, and other Articles susceptible of Fire) in the Occupation of Samuel Handscombe, and situated in the Town of Woburn aforefaid, was observed to be on Fire, but that, by the timely Exertions of the Populace, the same was got under before the Flames had made any considerable Progress; and that, from different concurring Circumstances, it was manifest, that the said Barn, as well as the thatched Workshop before mentioned; were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons uninown, with a View to burn

the Whole or the greatift Part of the faid Town, which it is believed would have taken Effect, from the Nature and Position of the faid Premises, the Direction of the Wind, and other Circumstances, if the Five, in both Instances, bad not been providentially discovered in Time to frustrate the wicked Designs of the Incendiaries who meditated the same.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bring-ing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Felonies above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually set Fire to either of the said Premises) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
