“ of poor Souls for to get their Wealth and now you makes a god of it But if you would with to live at Newtown any longer I Desire you would take your god out of the Stocks and pay every Body their own and not distrefs every Person as you Do and do it as soon as possible or else your house will Be Set on fire about your ears and Burn you to for you are no better worth for all the world groans Because of your Roguishness But do it as soon as possible or else it will come on you unewares like a thief in the night pay every person their own and you need not fear and do it quick or else you soon will Birn in newtown house
