Madrid, May 31.

N the 24th and 25th instant, the King and the whole Court were en ertained with a Bull Feast at Buen Retiro, in which some Horses were killed, and some Persons We have an account from Majorca, that 10 French Men of War arrived there the 6th or 7th instant from Thoulen, and having de-manded the resistation of several Vesses taken by the Privateers of that Illand, the Governor refused it; whereupon the French, who had before surprized some Saetia's that were in thet Port, sent out their long Boats to take twoPetacha's that were likewife there, but they met with fo great relissance from the faid Petacha's, who were affilted by the Cannon of the Town, that the French having loft 40 or 50 men, were forced to retire. Our Letters from Lisbon of the 23d instant advise, that two or three days before the Count d'Estree arrived with 18 Sail in Cascay Bay; that he had been privately at Court to wait upon the Prince, who had made him a Prefent of a rich Jewel, and offresh Provisions for his ships, and that the Marriage between the Infanta and the Duke of Savoy, was in a fair way to be concluded.

Genoua, May 31. Not any Ships have arrived here this week, fave two Genoueses from Alicant. From Majorca we have advice, that severel French Men of War arriving there from Thoulon, had demanded a Million and half of pieces of Light, in confideration of the Prizes which they pretend the Majorkins have taken from the Kings Subjects, since the Publication of the Peace; and that not being graned, they had made an attempt upon some Vessels in the Port of Majorca, in which they were repulsed; that thereupon the French were gone over for Argiers, to demand the liberty of several French, who have been taken and made Slaves by those Pyrats, notwithstanding the Peace. It is reported here that the French Forces march towards Geneva.

Copenhagen, Fune 6. Yesterday the Sieur Zeestadt, and the Sieur Lund, our Kings Deputies, had a meeting with Lieutenant General Sperling at Lundun, to adjust the Preliminaries concerning the meeting of the Ambassadors of the two Crowns, who are to treat the Peace.

Hamburg, June 9. The Brandenburgh Capers have taken three of our Merchant Ships which came from Portugal, and two others are missing. From Livonia our Letters inform us, that the Suedes are recruiting their Troops, in order to their returning a second time into Prussa, which they say they will do with an Army of 20000 men.

Hamburg, June 16. Count Coningsmarke is arrived with 600 men in Schonen from Pomeren, and the rest of the Suedes Soldiers that remain there, will tollow very speeding. The King of Denmark has ap-

pointed the Rendervous of his Army to be on the 26th instant in ar Gottorp; and in the mean time great care is taken to provide Corn and other Provisions for its substitute. This City is not yet freed of the jealousie it has of the designs of some of its Neighbors, and therefore our Senate is sending Deputies to trance, to recommend this City and its Interests to the kindness and protestion of that King.

Strasburg, Fune 5. The French Cavalry quartered in Alface, is expecting Orders every hour to march towards the Saar, where they are to join some Infantry, in order, as is said; to the attacking two small places which the Duke of Lorrain is possessed of.

Wesel, June 9. Yesterday in the asternoon the Marcschal de Crequi arrived here, and was saluted with a treble discharge of all the Cannon round the place; this evening he will part hence again for Suest in the Country of Marke, where Monsteur Calvo has at present his Head-quarter, a considerable Rody of Horse and Foot follows him with a Train of Articery, and when they are joined with those tist die now with Monsseur Calvo, they will make an Army of between 30 and 40000 men. The Bores of this Country, and of that of Marke, destroy a great many of the French Soldiers, which they meet stragling, and here is a report that they lately fell upon a great many ny French Officers who were going to a place called Altena, and killed most of them. Lieutenaur Geleral Spaen was, according to our last Advice, encamped with the Troops under his command near Bylevelt.

Cologne, June 13. The Mareichal de Crequi, who arrived at Nuis on Wednesday last with a Coard of 400 Horse, parted thence the same day for Wesel, being followed by the rest of his Troops, and his Artillery.

Cologne, June 16. On Tuesday last the Mateschal de Crequi, and Licutenant General Ca vo, passed the Lippe at Lipstadt, with a considerable Body of Horse and Foot, and encamped about a League on the other fide of it, on a Heath. The rest of the French Troops, that were in the Countrey of Marke, were to pais the Lippe the next day, and to join the Maz reschal, who was resolved to decamp with the whole Army as yesterday, and to march towards Minden, under the Cannon of which Monficur Space is posted with his Troops. Several thousand French are within these two or three dayes come from the Meuse, that so they may march together towards Wefel, to pais the Rhine there. M. nieur Lowvoy arrived the 10th instant at Brifac, and from thence went to Friburg.

Hague, June 16. A Treaty having been lately concluded by the Commissioners of this State with the Government of Argiers, the same has been sent to the several Provinces for their approbation. The States, as we are informed, have ordered that directions be sent to their Ambassadors in France, to expostulate with the Ministers at that Court, upon what has happened at Orange, where a Cross has lately in a solemn manner been set up in some part of the Town, by order of the most Christian King, and the Magilirates obliged to affiltat it, to the prejudice of the Right of the Prince of Orange, who is absolute Sovereign of the place; and contrary to the late Treaty by which his Highness is re-established in the Sovereignty thereof, and all the Rights ap-

pertaing to it.

Hague, June 20. The States of Holland met on Saturday, but came not to any resolution upon the Points before them, concerning the giving up Mae-Aricht to the Spaniards, and the restoring the Jurisdiction of the Prince of Liege there, which they deferred till their next meeting, which will be on the of the next month. The Letters from Hamburg say, that the Treaty in Schonen was to begin the 25th instant; that the Ambassadors were to meet in Tents near Lunden; and from Berlin we are told, t at Count Carelfon, natural Son of the last King of Sueden, who was taken prisoner in Prussia, had received his liberty from the Elector, who ofter he had dined with him, took his own Sword from his fide, and presented him with it, and besides charged him with Letters for the King of Sueden. The Heer Brederode the last of that Family is dead.

Amsterdam, June 20. From Hamburg we have advice, that an Express was arrived there in five days From Paris, and that without making any stay, he continued his Journey to Berlin, being charged with Letters from the Brandenburg Minister at the French Court to his Electoral Highness, so that we may now in few days expect to know what resolution the Elector has taken upon them, and consequently know, whether there will be Peace or War. In the mean time the French Army, under the command of the Mareichal de Crequi, has passed the Lippe, and is marching towrrds Minden, to befiege that place, which we hear is provided with a very good Garison, and all things necessary for its defence. There are great hopes that the Conferences which are going to be held in Schopen, will prove successful; the Ambassadors are to meet in the Field near Lundun, where for their Accommodation Tents will be fet up.
