Madrid, May 31.

ON the 24th and 25th instant, the King and the whole Court were entertained with a Bull Feast at *Buen Retiro*, in which some Horses were killed, and some Persons wounded. We have an account from *Majorca*, that 10 French Men of War arrived there the 6th or 7th instant from *Tboulon*, and having demanded the restitution of several Vessels taken by the Privateers of that Island, the Governor refused it; whereupon the French, who had before surprized some *Saetia's* that were in that Port, sent out their long Boats to take two *Petacha's* that were likewise there, but they met with so great resistance from the said *Petacha's*, who were assisted by the Cannon of the Town, that the French having lost 40 or 50 men, were forced to retire. Our Letters from *Lisbon* of the 23d instant advise, that two or three days before the Count *d'Estree* arrived with 18 Sail in *Cascay Bay*; that he had been privately at Court to wait upon the Prince, who had made him a Present of a rich Jewel, and of fresh Provisions for his Ships, and that the Marriage between the Infanta and the Duke of *Savoy*, was in a fair way to be concluded.

Genova, May 31. Not any Ships have arrived here this week, save two *Genoueses* from *Alicant*. From *Majorca* we have advice, that several French Men of War arriving there from *Tboulon*, had demanded a Million and half of pieces of Eight, in consideration of the Prizes which they pretend the *Majorjkins* have taken from the Kings Subjects, since the Publication of the Peace; and that not being granted, they had made an attempt upon some Vessels in the Port of *Majorca*, in which they were repulsed; that thereupon the French were gone over for *Argiers*, to demand the liberty of several French, who have been taken and made Slaves by those Pyrats, notwithstanding the Peace. It is reported here that the French Forces march towards *Geneva*.

Copenhagen, June 6. Yesterday the *Sieur Zeeftadt*, and the *Sieur Lund*, our Kings Deputies, had a meeting with Lieutenant General *Sperling* at *Lundun*, to adjust the Preliminaries concerning the meeting of the Ambassadors of the two Crowns, who are to treat the Peace.

Hamburg, June 9. The *Brandenburgh* Capers have taken three of our Merchant Ships which came from *Portugal*, and two others are missing. From *Livonia* our Letters inform us, that the Suedes are recruiting their Troops, in order to their returning a second time into *Prussia*, which they say they will do with an Army of 20000 men.

Hamburg, June 16. Count *Coningsmarke* is arrived with 600 men in *Schonen* from *Pomeren*, and the rest of the Suedes Soldiers that remain there, will follow very speedily. The King of *Denmark* has ap-

pointed the Rendezvous of his Army to be on the 26th instant near *Gottorp*; and in the mean time great care is taken to provide Corn and other Provisions for its subsistence. This City is not yet freed of the jealousy it has of the designs of some of its Neighbors, and therefore our Senate is sending Deputies to *France*, to recommend this City and its Interests to the kindness and protection of that King.

Strasburg, June 5. The French Cavalry quartered in *Alsace*, is expecting Orders every hour to march towards the *Saar*, where they are to join some Infantry, in order, as is said; to the attacking two small places which the Duke of *Lorraine* is possessed of. Monsieur *de Louvoy* is expected the 11th instant at *Brisac*.

Wesel, June 9. Yesterday in the afternoon the *Marschal de Crequi* arrived here, and was saluted with a treble discharge of all the Cannon round the place; this evening he will part hence again for *Sooft* in the Country of *Marke*, where Monsieur *Calvo* has at present his Head-quarter, a considerable Body of Horse and Foot follows him with a Train of Artillery, and when they are joined with those that are now with Monsieur *Calvo*, they will make an Army of between 30 and 40000 men. The Borders of this Country, and of that of *Marke*, destroy a great many of the French Soldiers, which they meet stragling, and here is a report that they lately fell upon a great many French Officers who were going to a place called *Altena*, and killed most of them. Lieutenant General *Spaen* was, according to our last Advice, encamped with the Troops under his command near *Bylevelt*.

Cologne, June 13. The *Marschal de Crequi*, who arrived at *Nuis* on Wednesday last with a Guard of 400 Horse, parted thence the same day for *Wesel*, being followed by the rest of his Troops, and his Artillery.

Cologne, June 16. On Tuesday last the *Marschal de Crequi*, and Lieutenant General *Ca wo*, passed the *Lippe* at *Lipstadt*, with a considerable Body of Horse and Foot, and encamped about a League on the other side of it, on a Heath. The rest of the French Troops, that were in the Countrey of *Marke*, were to pass the *Lippe* the next day, and to join the *Marschal*, who was resolved to detamp with the whole Army as yesterday, and to march towards *Minden*, under the Cannon of which Monsieur *Spaen* is posted with his Troops. Several thousand French are within these two or three dayes come from the *Meuse*, that so they may march together towards *Wesel*, to pass the *Rhine* there. Monsieur *Louvoy* arrived the 10th instant at *Brisac*, and from thence went to *Friburg*.

Trier, June 14. We have advice that Monsieur *de Buffs*, who commands the French Troops on the *Saar*, has sent to Monsieur *Chavignac*, to let him know, that if he do not retire with the Imperial Troops from those Parts, he shall be obliged to treat them as Enemies,

in miles. It is believed that the French intend to attack the Castle of *Hombourg* and *Bruch*, which yet remain in the possession of the Duke of *Lorraine*.

Bruffels, June 20. The States of *Holland* are extra-ordinarily assembled to take a resolution upon the Memorial of *Don Emanuel de Lyra*, concerning *Maastricht*, which we here persuade our selves will be by the States delivered up, according to the obligation they are under. Though the Letters we receive from *Maastricht* of the 17th, give ground to believe the contrary, for they say great quantities of Ammunition arrive daily there from *Holland*, and that they were going to add to the Fortifications of the place two new Ballions, one at the *Brusfels*, the other at the *Tongres Gate*, which it's probable they would not do, had they any intention to part with it.

Hague, June 16. A Treaty having been lately concluded by the Commissioners of this State with the Government of *Argiers*, the same has been sent to the several Provinces for their approbation. The States, as we are informed, have ordered that directions be sent to their Ambassadors in *France*, to expostulate with the Ministers at that Court, upon what has happened at *Orange*, where a Cross has lately in a solemn manner been set up in some part of the Town, by order of the most Christian King, and the Magistrates obliged to assist it, to the prejudice of the Right of the Prince of *Orange*, who is absolute Sovereign of the place; and contrary to the late Treaty by which his Highness is re-established in the Sovereignty thereof, and all the Rights appertaining to it.

Hague, June 20. The States of *Holland* met on Saturday, but came not to any resolution upon the Points before them, concerning the giving up *Maastricht* to the Spaniards, and the restoring the Jurisdiction of the Prince of *Liege* there, which they deferred till their next meeting, which will be on the 6th of the next month. The Letters from *Hamburg* say, that the Treaty in *Skonen* was to begin the 25th instant; that the Ambassadors were to meet in Tents near *Lunden*; and from *Berlin* we are told, that Count *Carelson*, natural Son of the last King of *Sueden*, who was taken prisoner in *Prussia*, had received his liberty from the Elector, who after he had dined with him, took his own Sword from his side, and presented him with it, and besides charged him with Letters for the King of *Sueden*. The Heir *Brederode* the last of that Family is dead.

Amsterdam, June 20. From *Hamburg* we have advice, that an Express was arrived there in five days from *Paris*, and that without making any stay, he continued his Journey to *Berlin*, being charged with Letters from the *Brandenburg* Minister at the French Court to his Electoral Highness, so that we may now in few days expect to know what resolution the Elector has taken upon them, and consequently know, whether there will be Peace or War. In the mean time the French Army, under the command of the *Marschal de Crequi*, has passed the *Lippe*, and is marching towards *Minden*, to besiege that place, which we hear is provided with a very good Garrison, and all things necessary for its defence. There are great hopes that the Conferences which are going to be held in *Schoonen*, will prove successful; the Ambassadors are to meet in the Field near *Lundum*, where for their Accommodation Tents will be set up.

Paris, June 21. On Friday or Saturday next the

Courier which the *Seigneur Meinders* Envoy of the Elector of *Brandenburg*, sent to inform his Master of the resolutions of this Court with relation to the Peace of the North, is expected back, and will it's not doubted bring instructions to the said Envoy how to proceed in the Negotiation, he is entred upon here. On Monday last happened a great disorder upon *Pont-neuf*, begun by a quarrel between some idle people, in which 70 or 80 persons were at last engaged, and that with so much heat, that it lasted several hours, and 4 or 5 persons were killed, and 15 or 16 wounded.

Falmouth, June 9. There are now in this Port the *Mary*, and *Dragon* of *London*, and the *Peace* of *Middleburg*, all three from *Guinea*; and the *Cesar* of *London*, from the *East Indies*.

London, June 14. Yesterday *Thomas White*, alias *Whitebread*, Provincial of the Jesuites in *England*, *William Harcourt* pretended Rector of *London*, *John Fenwicke* Procurator for the Jesuites in *England*, *John Gaven*, alias *Gawen*, and *Anthony Turner*, all Jesuites and Priests, were brought to their Tryal at the *Old Baily*, by virtue of a Commission of *Oyer and Terminer*, being Indicted of High-Treason, for Conspiring the Death of His Majesty, and the Subversion of the Government, and Protestant Religion, and upon full Evidence, were found Guilty. And this day *Richard Langborne*, Counsellor at Law, who was Indicted for the same Crimes, was, after a long Tryal, likewise found Guilty: And then Sentence passed upon them all Six, to be Drawn, Hanged, and Quartered.
