Hague, June 30. There having been adispute of many years between the count and Countels of Benthem, concerning the Education of their Children, in matter of Religion, the Countels being a Protefiant, and her Husbanda Roman-Catholick, she retired hither with them, and craved the Protection of thi State, which was accorded her; the Countes being larely dead, the Count again demands his Children, and the trench Amballador has given in a Memorial to the States, to second him in it. The 4th of the next month the Stat s of Holland are to meet, against which time the Prince of Orange is expected here; We shall then see what Resolution will be

taken in the matter concerning Massiriebt.

Para, fuly 1. The 29th past, the Treaty of Peace betwe n this Crown and the Elector of Brandenburgh, was Signed by the King's Commissioners, and the Sieur Meinders, the Elector's Envoye. By this Tr aty, the Elector reflores all he has taken during this War to Sueden, except two Baillages on th. River Oder, called Littus Regium, in which are 25 or 30 Villages; and in recompence, is to have a good Sum of money; which are all the Particulars we can tell you at picfenr. There has la ely happened a Rencount r near Minden, between some French and Brandenburgh Troops, which latter, after having fultained great loss, retired into the Town. On our fide a Colonel, and several other Officers, were kil-

London, June 20. This day Thomas Whitebread, Wiliam Harcours, John Ferwicke, John Gaven, and Anthony Turner, Jesuices, were drawn upon Sledges to Tyburne, and there Hanged and Quartered, according to the entence past upon them the 14th instant at the Old Baily.

Lyme, June 23. Yesterday a Flect of above 60 Sail of Merchant Ships, most Duch, with three or four Men of War their Convoy, patted by this place to the Wellward, being bound for the Streights.

Edenburgh, June 20, at midnight. Testerday merning bis Grace the Duke of Bucclugh and Monmooth, parted from hence, and joined the King's Forces at Blackburne; and that Evening fent out Major Ogle thorpe with a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons, who met with a Party or two of the Rebels, which fresently Resired. This morning his Grace decamped with the Army, and advanced within Six Miles of Hamilton, whither the Rebels are Retreated, baving encamped their Foot in the Little Park there, and posted their Horse along the River. It is faid they are 6 or 7000 strong, and that some Gentlemen, as Robert Stewart, Bruther to the Earl of Galloway, and two or three more, are come in to them To morrow morning the Kirg's Forces, who are at present 10000 strong, (the meritors and Militia of the Northern Counties not baving jet joined them) march again towards the Rebels.

Edenburgh, June 22. at midnight. This morning, about Seven a Clock, His Majesties Forces, under the Command of the Duke of Bucclugh and Monmouth, were drawn up at Pothwell Brilge, which the Rebels (hing on the other fide thereof) had

Larricadoed. Where a Paper was brought to the Lord General by one of the Rebels, representing, That they would lay down their Arms upon no other Terms, than thoje expressed in their last Dec aration. To which his Grace answered. That those were distructive to the King's Authority, and contrary to the Lundamental Laws and Co. st tutions of this Kingdom; and that they were to expect no other Articles from kim, but to lay down their Arms, and to render themselves to the King's Merry. Which the Rebels refusing to do, his Grace ordered the Cannon to p ay upon them (which put them into some disorder) and a Party to attack the Bridge, which was done, and after same dispute the Rebels that defended it, were beaten from it: whereupon greatest part of the King's Forces passed the Bridge, and attacked the Rebels Hosse (the Cannon continuing to play upon them) who then began to Run, and to Scatter, Leaving their Foot to shift for themselves, who were Totally Routed, some hundreds being left dead upon the Place, many hundreds made Prisoners, and those that remained, flying into the Wood of Hamilton, which is now Surrounded by E is Majesties Forces, and a detached Farty, under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel James Douglas, is fent into the Wood after them, who will doubtless give a good account of them; and the King's Horse and Dragoons pursue the scattered Horse of the Rebels, of which there are not 20 together.

The Lord General behaved himself with extraordinary Conduct and Bravery; and all the Officers, Gentlemen and Soldiers, have carried themselves with great Chearful-ness and Resolution: But above all, the Mercy of God has been most Signal, in rl.as, though the Rebels were near 7000, yet are they Totally Defeated, without any Loss to His Majest es Forces, Save of two or three common Soldiers killed, and some few wounded.
