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HE 21 inflant failed from hence 3 of our Men of War, having orders to go and Cruife in the Mediterranean; on board of them were the Admiral and Vice Admiral of this Crown, though in quality only of Voluntiers; it is believed they will go alhoar at Nizza, and from thence pass to Turin to make their compliments to the Duke of Savoy, who is to Marry our Infanta.

Genoua, July 19. The 16th instant came in here the Mercury, John Catter Master from Marseilles, and last night the Laurel, John Pain from Trapany; from whence he came 1001 11 days since in company of the Lant and the St Lucar, Merchants bound for Keniee. Sir William Poole in the Happy Return is upon his departure for Leghorn, and with him the Tyger, the Exchange, the Martin, the Mercury, and Charles and Richard. The French Galleys are still at Leghorn; those designed from hence for Corsica have not yet fixed the time of their departure.

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Ratisbonne, Fuly 20. Most of the States are extreamly folicitous to free the Empire of the Imperial Troops, who are very burthenfom to them, and among the rest the Circle of Suabia, as being at a greater Charge than any other, is very active in this matter; while on the other hand it is reprefented to them by the Imperial Ministers, how unbecoming it is the Dignity of the Emperor, and how dangerous to several places, who still lie un-der great apprehensions of the French Armes, for the Emperor to draw his Troops out of the Em. pire, while those of France remain in it; and at the fame time offer wholly to rid the Empire of the faid Imperial Troops, and to provide Quarters for them in the Emperor's Heriditary Countries, in case the several Circles will themselves raise and maintain such a Force as may be able to secure them against the Invasions and disturbances of any Forreign Power. But after all, the States tellolved yesterday again to pray the Emperor to fetire his **Forces**

Hamburg, July 28. Our fears being increased by the drawing together of so many Troops in our Neighborhood, our Magistrates have made a Treaty with the Duke of Zell, by which he promises to assist as with 3000 men, in case of need. The French Troops that were sent to raise the Contributions of Oldenburg and Delmenhors, continue still there, and for that reason the King of Demark, remains in these parts, to observe them, and to hinder their passing the Elbe, in case they should attempt it. There are Letters from Berlin which say, that the Elector had lately had several long Consecutes with his general Officers, and that the proparations of War, which were making in stycral places before the Peace, are still continued; which the Politicians make Resection upon. The French demanded of the Duke of Hanouer; that the Noops

which were raised and maintained with their money, might be put into their service, or else that those moneys might be repaid; but the said Duke, before he parted for Italy, delivered those Troops, which are 10 or 12000 men, up to the Duke of Zell, to whom they have take 1 an Oath of Fideli y.

Brussels, August 1. On Sunday last Count Egmont, late Ambassador from the Crown of Spain in English

land, arrived here, and was that Evening to pay his respects to his Excellency. He is now preparing to go and take possession of the covernment of Sardinia, of which he is made Viceroy. Monficur Calbert the French Ambassadors Train and Equipage is come hither from Nimeguan, with Orders to stay for him here. On Frid y next his Excellency sets out from hence for Luxemburg, where he will be taken up eight or ten days in ictling the affairs of that Province. Our Letters from the Meufe affure us that the French Army is retiring out of the Brandenburg Teritories, that they will repais the Rhine at Wefel, and then march in three Bodys, the first towards the Mojelle, and the other two by different ways towards the Muse. The Mareichal de Crequi and the Count de Roye, purpos , in their return for Paru, to pass this way. From Struburg of the 24th path they write, That Monsieur de Buffy was encamped at Linbain with a Body of Horse and Foot: That the French continue to treat the Subjects of the City, of Straburg, who have any Revenues in the Country, as Enemies, because they retain the Emperors Troops in Carifon; and that the French have builded the Canal they were making between Schlestadt and Kastenbolis, being 12 foot broad and

That the States gained fal have finally consented to the reclabilithment of the Prince of Liege's Jurisdiction at Maestrickt; That they were working hard on the Fortistications of that City, and that very considerable stores of Ammunition, &c. were lately arrived there from Holland. From Lipsadt of the 29th pall they write, that the French Army decamped the 28 and marched towards the Rhine. From Berlin we have advice, that they Elector of Brandenburg was making of new levies, and that a great quantity of Fire-works were preparing, and that his Troops were marching in all diligence towards the Elbe.

Paris, August 5. The King had made choice of the Marquis de Vitri to go in quality of his Amballador to the Crown of Poland, but hath since changed his resolution, and will now seed him to the Emperor. On Tuessay night last hapened a Fire, in the Queens stables at St. Germain, 10 cm 12 horses were burnt, and others very much spoiled. Monsicur de Louvoy has had the missorture to break his leg in two peices by a fall from his horse. The 28th past the Mareschal de Crequi d camped from the technical control of Minden, and marched towards
