Madrid, August 10.

N the 27th paft, Don - Lucas Giung de Serge Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of Ragufa, had his first Audience of this King, the first Minister that hath come hither from that State, this many years. On the 30th the Duke of Paltrahad began his Journy hence for Paris, with the Character of Ambaffador Extraordinary to the Esench King, and carried a Jewel of great value from hisCatholick Majefly to his new Queen. His Excellency took Horfe here at the Palace gate about fix of the Clock in the evening, his company, confifting of fix Post-Boys clad in Liveries of green Velvet, every one with a filver Horn in his hand ; thefe led the way, and after then nid twelve of his Majeftics Correos well mounted, then the Duke and his two Brothers, Don Foseph, and Don Gaspar de Silus, very richly clad after the French Falhion and about twelve of their principal Servants followed. In this manner they palled through fome of the chief Streets of the Town, going out at the Gate of Alcala, a great concourse of all forts of people rwaiting in the Streets and Balconies to fee this Formality, which lasted only till they got out of the faid Gate, where they took Coaches, and other Hor-ics and Mules to proceed on their Journy. On the 2d inflant an Extraordinary dispatched by the Marquis of Carpio , Spanish Ambassador in-Rame, brought advice of the Popes having given his DIFpenfation for the Marriage of this King with his Coulin the Princels Maria Louisa of Orleans, of which Bull one Duplicate is fent hither, and another to Paris. Yesterday the Marquis de Villars Ambasiador from his Most Christian Majesty, made his Entry here, and had the first publick Audience of this King; the hour appointed for the Ceremony was Eleven of the Clock in the morning; but feveral Disputes arising about places in the Cavalcade, the Ambaffador reached not the Palace till one of the Clock, by which time his Majeily had Dined. The first dilpute was about Precedence of Coaches, the Nuntio's (through ignorance of fome Servains) thrufting is felf immediately after the Kings, the place always allowed to the Ambaffadors Coach that maketh the Entry, which could not be re-estified until the Marquis himfelf came back to adjust the matter, convincing the Nuncio's Servanes of their Erfor, and putting his route of sol takes of their Erfor, and putting his own firth Coach in that place which they pretchded. The other was with the Kings Family, who, according to Cu-flom, rid immediately before the Amballador as the molt fiondwrable place, which his Excellency would have had for his own Servants, but those of his Majelly not confenting thereunto, the Amballa-

don was forced to yield. I The Marquis d' Allorgus Mayordomo Mayor and the Dutchels of Ternanova Gamarrera Mayor to the new Quicon, are preparing very fplendid Equipages for their receiving cand waiting on her Majelly on the Erontiers. Or the fourth inftant Health was proclaimed at Malaga, the Plague Hofpitals having been that up above fifteen days, in which time it pleafed God that the body died in the whole City of the Sickness; but it encreaseth much at Granada and Ronda FrontsEsbon of the first instant we have advice, that alt things there relativg to their own Domellique Affairs, were in a very peaceable condition, and likely to conti-nue fo, the Prince having brought the Chamber of that City to a fubmission pand the heats of the people tona better temper, infomuch that it was not doubted but the Taxes which his Highnels required would be quickly paid. Hamburg, Aug. 22. The King of Denmark after having spent-leveral days to view this City on all fides of it; and even on the fide of the River, paffing to the phipofe to and fro in a small Boat, accompanied by some of his General Officers, is gone for Rensberg, to give Audience to the Mostcovite Amballador; after which fome fay he will go to Copenbagen, others, that he will return hither. From Pomeren our Letters give us an account, that the Elector of Brandenburg goes on with his Miltary preparations, but that his defigns cannot be dilcovered.

Strasburg, 'dug. 14. This day the Count d'Aro General of the Imperial Artillety, parted hence for *Philipsburg*, where the Imperial Troops are drawing together in order to their marching towards Bobemia. The French do now defift from requiring any more Contributions in Allace, and from treating the Subjects of this City as they used to do.

Bruffers, Ang. 18. His Excellence is All at Lhaemburg, where he doubts not of fetling things to his fatisfaction, and hopes afterwards to do the like at Neuror Nomer and in Folanders. Our Letters from Liega of the 16 inflam lay, That the whole Lrench Army had reputed the Rhine at Wefel, but that the Marefchal de Crequi cont nued there very much indipoted of the Gout, The Imp rial Troopsthat were in the City and Countrey of Cleves are retired from thence.

Ninequen, Aug. 21. As well the Imperial as Suedes Ambafiadors that fill remain here, have now received orders to return-home. Monficur Hoeg the Danilh Ambafiador is flithere; the difcourfe is that he is to go for France, to conclude the Peace there; but his Excellency does not yeth wown to have any fuch orders. The Marefehal de Creaui is detained at Welet- being very much indif-

L poled with the Gout, which has frized him very violently. The French Troops in the mean time, who have now all repaired the *Rhine*, are marshing home, except those that fill remain in the Diotess of Cologne and the Country of Juliers.

Hague, Aug. 25. The Spanish Minister Don Emamuel de Lyra, who we told you in our laft, had gi-ven in an answer to the refolution, of the States concerning Maestricht, took his leave of the States the 21 inftant, and the next day parted from hence for Bruffels; his fuctoffor Don Balthafar de Fusn Mayor is expected here in few days. The Letter syntich the States have writto the Elector of Brandeputy, in answer to his, is made publick. In the first place they acknowledged the great lervices he hath rendred this State, and particularly in the late War; affure him that they will always keep the fame freth in their memory, and make all fuitable greturns, as it shall be in their power; Then they Het himfee, that they were not wanting, during she War, to support, to the utmost of their ability, the common Interests, that if the rest of the Allies shad dong the like, things might have had a better iliue. That they were very forry they were for-ced by the necessity of affairs, to conclude the peace upon the terms they did, but that when they faw the Spanish Neatherlands ready to be loff, themselves exhausted, their Inhabitants ruined, through want of Trade, and no longer able to bear the burthen of the War, they were necessitated to accept of the conditions offered by France, as spain likewife did; That fince the peace, they have laboured all they could to obtain a Neutrality for his Countreys of Cleves and Mark, but in vain, France having ftill refused it. And in conclusion, they dedice he will continue his friendship to them, which they shall always sultivate on their parts as becomes fincere and true Allies; The Prince and Princels of Grange, according to our last Lerrers, were arrived at Massfricht, where they had been received

with great respect. Paris, Aug. 26. The 20th inftant the Marquis de los Balbaces, the Spanish Ambalis dor, had a publick Audieuce of the King, when he put into His Majellies hands the Popes Dispensation for the Marriage of the King of Spain with Madamoifelle, as also a Procuration, by versue of which the Prince de Consti is tomarry her in the name of the faid King. Prince William of Funsemerg, who after Several years impriforment requy red his liberty by the Peace, arrived here two days fince, and was very kindly received by the King. The 24th, died the Cardinal de Retz in the 66 year of his age; he was formerly Archbilhop of this place, which he refigned in 1661, and was made Abbot of St. Denis; in 1675 he fent back his Cardinals Cap to Rome, intending go retire from the World; but the Pope would not receive it, and obliged him to keep it till his death. We hear at prefent very little of the affairs of the North, though most people are of opinion that the Peace between Sueden and Denmark will be fuddenly concluded either here or in Schenen.

Plimonth, Aug. 15. The 13th arrived here the Diamond and the Pearl Frigats, with feveral Merchant Ships under their Convoy from the Streights; those that put in here, are, the William and John of London, William Skew Masser; the Hopeful Merchant of London, John Pierce; the of Lonthon, Richa d Martin; the Friend of this place, William Matthews, bound for London. The 14th came in here the Pearl of Topfham, Jonathan Smith Masser, bound for the Streights. Yesterday failed hence the Ruby and Dartmouth. Frigats to the Westward to Cruife.
