Hague, Dec. 12. In our last we gave you an account, that an everture had been made to the States of Holand, concerning a Defensive Alliance between France and this state, and that the States, after a long debate thereupon adjourned themselves till this day fevennight; to which we can now only add, That the French Ambassador is not wanting in the mean time, in his erdeavours to promote this matter; and its faid, that he has told the Deputies, that if they value his Malters friendship, they must conclude this Alliance, and that speedily; that His Majerly may otherwise know what mea ures le has to take. From Zell we have an account, that the Sieur Grabenthal, the Swedes Min fler was arrived there with the King of Swedens Ratification of the Treaty concluded by the Sicur Ratenac, and that he demanded that the places in Bremen should be restored to the King of Sweden, immediately after the exchange of the Ratifications, but that the Duke of Zell's Ministers alledged, the fame was not to be done till three months after, and till the Moneys he is to receive in confideration thereof be paid him; to which, the Sieur Grabenthal answered, That as for the payment of those Moneys, the Crown of Erance was to take care (fit.

Paru, Dec. 16. The 7th instant the Duke of Giovinazzo, Ambastador Extraordinary from Spain, had a private Audie. ce of the King. The Mareschal de Eumieres is returned from Lorrain, to his Government of Flanders, and the 6 instant made a publick Entry inso Tournay. We have nothing new from Eavaria. On Wednesday last the Lord Bruce and his Lady arrived here, as did the day following the Duke of Buckingham and Sir Elia Leighton.

Falmouth, Dec. 4. On Tuesday and yesterday came in here several Vessels from France, with Wine and Brandy, bound for Holland. They report, that several French men of War are sitting out. The same day arrived the Charles of New York, bound for Holland.

Edenburg, Dec. 4. The Privy Council meeting this day (being the first time they have so done, since his Royal-Highness's coming into this Kingdom) his Royal Highness was conducted by the whole Nobility to the Council Chamber, where (all, except the Privy Cruriellors withdrawing) his Royal Highness took his place at the Board, and then the Lord Chanceller, in the name of the Council, made their Compliment to him, which his Royal Highness returned in very affectionate term, expressing his great satisfaction at the civility he had met with since his entring into this Kingdom, and declaring his readiness to do every thing that lay in his power, to promote the Honour and Service of the King, and the Interests of this Kingdom.

The five Rebeis, whose obstinacy in resuling the Kings Mercy, upon the condition only of Signing a Bond, not to take up Arms against His Majesty or His Authority for the suture, we gave you some time since an account of, have been executed according to the Sentence passed upon them, and are now hanging in Chains on the place where the late Archbishop of St. Andrews was murthered; which wicked and abominable action they would not own to be a Murther or a Sin.

Whitehal, Dec. 10. This afternoon the Iord Mayor and Court of Aldermen of London, attended ed His Majesty in Council, where the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesties Command acquainted them; That His Majesty was more than ordinatily concerned at present for the peate of the Kingdom, which there are endeavours using to disturb, by procuring Hands to tumultuous Petitions, tending to Sedition and Rebellion, which are framed, and lent for that purpole likewise into the Countrey, and that Letters had been intercepted, wherein the persons, to whom they are addressed, are bid to get as many Hands as they could to the faid Petitions, faying, That it mattered not though they were neither Gentlemen or Freeholders, but that they should be fure to get as many Hands as they could; which illegal and seditious practices, His Majesty was re-olved by no means to luffer, and that therefore His Majesty expected, that they the Lord Mayor and Aldermen would in their several stations, take care of His Majeslies Honor, and of the peace and fafety of the City, and not fuffer such persons as should Sign such Petitions, or go about to procure Hands to them, to go unpunished, but that they should proceed against them, or cause them to be brought before the Council-Board, to be punished as they deserve, according to a Judgement of all the Judges of England, 2 Facobi.
