Privateers have lately taken several Prizes of good value, two or three whereof had Guns, with which they made some resistance, amongst which one a West-India Ship richly laden, the particulars we shall know here-

Privateer of Truro, Commanded by Captin Manning, bringing in with him two French Prizes laden from Mantes with Salt for the Bank of about 100 Tuns spiece, called the St. Anne and St. Matthew; another Veffel, they had taken and ient into Pensance laden with Wines.

Three other Veffels they were also possest of, one laden with Hemp and Flax, a second with Wines, both which they were forced to fink, to avoid the Chace given them by two Men of War, but the third being an empty Barque day sent away with the prisoners which they had taken.

The 25th of March they met with a French Veffel laden with Clapboard, bound for Burdeaux, aboard the which they found four Souldiers, and several Letters, importing, The rhe Sickness was got into the French Fleet, and that the Men of War that were then at Rochelle, intended suddenly for Brest, near which place the French King was to take a view of them a The Vessel they sunk near Belie Isle, having first secured the Men and all the Letters, and went out expecting better purchase amongst the Bourdeaux Fleet, of whose coming curthey had timely notice, but were diverted by soul weather.

The French have about 18 of their Men of War cruising before Rochelle and the neighbouring Coafts, for the fecurity of them.

Rome, April 2. On Wednesday, March 29. His Holiness in his Bed affished at the Examination of Bishops, where he was observed to be more then usually pale and languishing, and his speech very weak, that night he was again affaulted with his I firmity, which frequently returns upon him: Cardinal D' Este no great friend to the Family of the Chigies, is arrived here inaugnito, with a numerous Train of Attendants, keeping cloic in his Palace, from whence he congratulated with the Cardinal Nephew, for his Uncles recovery from his late dangerous Fit, acquainting him, that the reason of his coming to Rome, was an express Command from the French King, of whose Interests he is Procecus here.

The Connestable Colonna is much resorted to by the Roman Nobility, which gives much justically to the Popes Family, who yet endeavour with much submission to make them lose the memory of former processings.

The Express sent by Don Mario, and Cardinal Chigi, to the Grand Duke, to excuse the non-promotion of the right-ness's Brother, found not the Recept for they expected, the Grand Duke refusing to open their Proquets, and hash caused their Arms formerly publickly fixt in several parts of Siena and that State, to be thrown down to the ground.

Vienna, April 4. The new Cardinal de Salsabargh has given his Imperial Majesty notice of his resolution to go suddenly for Rome: where he intends to appear in a more then assual equippage, attended by above 300 persons, among whom 40 Gentlemen, 14 Pages, 100 Footmen, 50 Swiffes, and a Guard of 50 Horse. He has also bespoke eight Coaches at Rome to attend him there in his Vistes, and has given order to his Treasurer to provide him 400000 Rixdollars for the defraying of his expences.

The Elector of Bavaria having likewise informed the Emperor of his design to go with Madam the Electrice his Wise, to Loretto, desiring leave to pass through the Arch-Dutchy of Tyrol; the Emperor has been willing to comply with his desires, and has given order to the Governor and Officers of that Arch-Dutchy to entertain him in his passage, and to desiray all his expences.

His Imperial Majesty has by the advice of his Council of War, given order to all Officers that are at present absence from their Commands, to repair immediately to their respective Regiments, and to be in reading so much upon the first Orders.

This week a Courrier was dispatcht for Spain, with the news of the Empresses being with childe.

From Raab our Letters tell us, that the Regiment de Geymani being upon a Muster found to be compleat and fulls they are resolved to draw out fifteen men out of each Company, to make up a full and diffinct Company, with their Officers; which with some other forces are to march for the assistance of the Venetians: They ay also, that the Turks have been seen in several parties, which drawn together, will form a small Army. This gives the Neighboring Towns some occasion to suspect some design upon them; though from Buda we are told, that they are intended for Walachia, and the Neighboring Provinces, which may probably engage Poland in farther troubles.

The Deputies tent from the Merchants for Confiantinople, for the re-eitablishment of Trade, have been civilly received by the Visier of Buda, who has promised to employ his interest in the Ottoman Court for their full satisfaction.

From Poland we are advised, that the King, with the greatest and most considerable part of the Nobility of the greatest and most considerable part of the Nobility of the

Kingdom, are willing to comply with the defires and pretenfrom of the Duke of Newburgh, and have conferred to his Succeffin; and that after the death of the King now Reigning, he fhall be declared King without any farther Ceremony. Mar fieur Giefen, the Dakes Chancellorsis leaving this Court, imending Suddenly for Poland.

The Spanish Ambassador in this Court, is by an order from the Court of spain, to be remanded, and another person to

Venice, April 8. Seignior Padavino, our Ambaffador, being arrived in Canea, by order from the Grand Vifier, the Turkifh forces were immediately drawn together in his vien, confifting of about 40000 Soldiers; where he was also told of greater force that was luddenly expected there; at whole arrival they intended to proceed in their intentions for the fiege of Candia : To which purpole, the Grand Visier has ordered the Posts to be reviewed, and a design formed for the intended Leaguer, their Cannons, and all other necessaries lying ready for that employment. A party of Turks from Can-dia Nova came up lately near the Walls of Candia in a bravery, bne were fo briskly entertained by a party that failied out upon them , that they were forced to quit the place in much hake and dilorder.

We have not lately received any A vies from the Convoy under the command of General Morofini, but conclude him lafe, and pursuing his voyage with as much speed as the winds will permit him. The Marquels Ville is attending his arrival

at Zante.

Several of our new railed Companies are now at Lide, with some old Soldiers, who are to be all of them formed into Companies, and to be fent part of them with General Valiero for the three Islands, and the rest for the Fleet, with the first Convoy that shall be got ready.

We are also advised, that twenty Vessels sent by the Corfayrs of Algier and Tunis, with Slaves for the Tu kifh fervice, have been lately caft away by Tempeft; and that a Turkish Veffel with fixty men, valued at Scoco Pieces of Eight, is

taken by some of our Ships.

Our Proveditor Francesco Barbaro paffing for Paros to take leave of the General Cornaro, before his return homewards, caused by his distemper, was met in the Archipelago by a Turkish Vessel of considerable strength, and a Saich with sity Turks abourd her, with great store of Ammunition, and some other lading of considerable value, passing from Negropont towards Canea, which as er some little resistance he took, and brought in with him to Paros.

Upon the death of our Ambailador in Vienna, the Senate

Park, April 15. The Treasurer of the States of Bretagne, having been committed to Pri on for refusing to pay a Million of Livres, at which sum he was taxed by the Chamber of Justice, has fince obtained his liberty by compounding for 400 thousand Livres, which gives some hopes to those that have not yet paid their Taxes, that they may be dealt with

His Majefty has lately fent a new Edict to the Parliament of Rouen, by which his Majesty puss in for his right to the third part of all the Woods in Normandy, now in the possesfion of the Nobility, and other persons, as having formerly belonged to the Forrests, and fince dismembred, excepting only such Woods as the Proprietors can justifie to have been planted by themselves or their Predecessors.

From Berne we are informed, that befides the forces already fent from the swife Cantons to the affiftance of Geneva, they are resolved to raise an Army of 7000 men to divert the Duke of Savey, by entring into his Countrey, in case the Duke strempt any thing farther upon Geneva, or arypan under their jurisdiction. Intending likewise to tave another Body of Men of the like number, to oppose any attempts that may be made upon the Cantons or their Allies; the Dukes Envoyé having in an Affembly of the Swife States at Aron, questioned their title to the Countrey of V. ulx.

We are not a little concerned at the late dealing of tholest Atgier with us in the late Release of Prisoners, which notwithstanding our Articles, they refused to tell us at their Market rate, upon a pretence, that the Moneys were not returned them in the time limited by the faid A ticles.

His Msjefty has been lately pleased to confer a Benefice of Eleven hundred Livies Rent, with a confiderable Pension upon the Sieur du Hamel Advocate, for the pains he to k in composing the Manifesto containing Sixy x Reasons, whereon his Majesty sounds his pretentions upon Brabant.

Hagues April 18. From Helvoetflays we are informed, that the Seamen are daily put aboard the Men of War there, which are for the most part in a great forwardness. All the great Ships are at an Anchor in the Stream, and a confider ble Fleet will be in a readinels to falute the Anbassadors # their arrival. At which time, the S'ates have resolved that de Ruyter (who is to be prefent at their Reception) shall upon the first view of the Ambassadors, send out two Yachts to conduct them from without the Gaets, having artifalued them with their Guns, and received the Ambassadors returns. But if the Ambassadors refuse to dis-embatk till they are within the Gaets, then the fi ft salute is to be expected from them, and to be returned by de Ruyter.

In order to the Treaty, the S ares General have fent two of their number, viz. the Heers Sevener and Rodenburgh to Breda, to take order with the Governor for all things neces-

fary for that Affembly.

On Tuesday next, the States of this Province are to af-semble, where it will be resolved how many persons shall be cholen out of each Province to affift at the Treaty; the other Provinces having left the choice of the number to this A.

The Dutchels Dowager of Naffam, Widow to the late Prince William of Frife, is arrived here to take her leave of the Electoress of Brandenburgh, who intends to depart hence about Munday or Tuesday next. Prince William being re-

turned from Cleves to attend her on her journey.

We are further confirmed in our intelligence, touching the apprehension of Pillars by an order from the Marqueis de Caffel Rodrigo, and his confession of a delign laid by him for the Delivery of Luxemburgh to the French; the particulars of his Examination and Confession are not yet made publick, but 'tis believed he will fuddenly receive the full reward of his practiles.

The Sieur Courtin is expected here from France, who with Monfieur D'Eftrades, is to be employed to Breda to ne-

gotiate for the Crown of France.

'Tis here confidently reported, that a Zealand Privateer has carried into Brefs an English Veffel of Seventy Tuns with Salt-peter; and other Commodities of confiderable

Hull, April 9. The three fmell Privateers continue fill cruifing, but we have not yet heard of any Prizes token by them.

Plymouth, April 9. On Saturday laft arrived here a small Vessel of this Town from Malaga, as also the Antelope, with four light Ships which were taken in their way from Rochelle.

Alborough, April 11. A fmall Dutch Galliot-Hoy has been feen upon thefe Coafts, which occasions our light this to fecure themselves; onely one light Hoy sell into his hands, which he fent away, and is hovering for more Prize. A small French Sloop was likewise seen on Munday and Tuesday last, to stand into this Bay, but a speedy course will be taken to free the Coafts from thefe Veffels. The French Veffel taken by the Fanfan, proves to be richly la-den, and by the long chace she endured, is supposed may prove prize, notwithstanding her pretences, and is sent to the Buoy in the More, to be further examined.
