Stockholme, Nov. 22.

Rom Schonen we have an account, that the 15 inflant the King gave Audience to a Moscovite Ambassador at Carelshaven; and that thence His Majesty was going to see a new Haven, lying between that place and Calmer, which being casie to be fortified, very commodious for building of Ships (by reason of the great quantity of Oak growing thereabouts) capable to harbor a very great Fleet, much easier of access then Stockbolme, and nearer to the Provinces on both fides of the Balticke, is intended to be for the future the station of the Kings Ships. There have been very great Storms in these Seas, and several Suedish Vetfels have been lost, among which it's faid is that which carried Major-General Grotehuysen to his designed Government of Wismar, but the greatest loss is that of several Vessels carrying over Soldiers for Pomeren, which were cast away on the Isle of Bornholme, above 700 Soldiers perishing.

Lisbon, Nov. 28. The 22 instant the Cortes met in the great Hall of the Palace, which was very

richly adorned. About two in the afternoon the Prince, in his ordinary Dress, as were all the Nobility, attended by fix Mace-bearers, seven Heralds, and the Officers of his House, entred the Hall, and being fat on his Throne, the Billiop of O-Porto made a long Oration in praise of his Highness, and of the Choice he had made for the Infanta, and recommended to the three Estates the dispencing with the Laws of Lanego about marrying with a Stranger; and the supplying his Highness with money for the defraying the Charges of this Marriage. Then spake one of the Procurators for this City, a Lawyer, in behalf of the Commons, extolling the Prince and his Government, as also the Duke of Savoy and his Family, and ended with the offer of themselves and their Estates to the service of his Highmess. This done a Herald called the Nobility to do Homage to the Prince, and after them the Commons, and lastly the Bishops. Then the Herald appointing to each of the three Estates a, several place of meeting, viz. at three feveral Convents, and dis rected them to begin their meetings the next day, the Prince arose, and returned to his own Apartment with the same Attendance that he came with. The next day the three Elates met apart, and the Marquis de Givea, one of the Procurators for this City, made a long and eloquent Oration to the Commons, of whom a great many were of the Nobility, upon the occasion of their meeting, which was so well liked, that 'tis not doubted but they will grant whatever the Prince shall defire of them, though there are like to be some difficulties about the manner of the raifing mony. What Sum will be demanded

is not yet mate known.

Genoua, Dec. 13. The 9th instant the 8 French
Gallies commanded by the Chevalier de Noailles re-

turned hither from Legorn, and upon the Senates refusing a second time to permit them to winter in their Arsenal, they sailed again the 11th homeward. The 10th at night sailed hence two Dutch Men of War, with sour English Merchant Ships, the Laurel, Mary Rose, Primrose, and Delight, homeward bound.

Prague, Dec. 9. The Plague is quite ccased at Vienna, and the Churches opened; but here we are still under some apprehensions of it; for yesterday it broke out in a house far distant from those that were formerly shut up. The Marriage between the Dauphin and the Princess of Bavaria is concluded, as it's hoped that will be ere long between

the Elector and the Emperors Daughter.

Marienzal in Franconie, Dec. 12. The Great Malter of the Teutonique Order, at present Viceroy of Hungary, having convoked a general Chapter to be held here, and those that have Voices there, being arrived, the 3d instant was performed the Ceremony of introducing Prince Louis Anthony of Neuburg, third Son to the Duke of Neuburg into that Order; the Ceremony whereof was thus, The Chapter being met in the great Church, the faid Prince was conducted thither, where Count d'ortinger and Count Fagger having de lared upon Oath that they had examined the Princes Arms, and found them what they ought to be, the fail Prince took the Oaths of Poverty, of Challicy, and to go to the War against the Infidels, when there is occasion, and then the Grand-Master put on him the Habit, which is a White Cloak with a Black Cross. faying these words, We Promise to give you as long as you live, Water, Bread, and a Habit. After the Ceremony was ended, the Prince and all the Knights were treated at Dinner by the Great Master. The next day another Chapter was called, where the faid Prince was chosen Coad, utor to the Great-Master, who by virtue of this Dignity enjoys a Revenue of 200000 Florins in Germany, has great Pretentions on the Princes of Italy, who have taken away several Lands belonging to that Order, and takes place in the Dyct next to the Electors.

Hamburg, Dec. 22. The French are raising a Regiment of Foot here, and another, as we are informed, at Francfort. They have hired all the Vessels in this River, and the Weser, which used at thetime of the Vintage, to go only with Ballast for France, and to return laden with Wines, on which they mean to transport great quantities of Oats, and other Corn (which they are therefore buying up in these parts) to Calaia and Dunkirk, and other places on that Coast. The Duke of Zest has ordered some Troops to march, in order to dislodge those of the Elector of Brandenburg which are now quartered in the Country of Mecklensburg; but it's hoped that matter will be composed by the Dutch Minister the Sieur d'Amerongen, who

labors in it.
